Note. William Foy married Eliza Clark, they were Mrs Jenkins' parents.

As you see, Eliza Clark 29e 16 and Rose (Rosanna) Clark 29e 11 are listed twice. My answer to that is that the two Clark's were visiting the occupants of households 94 & 133 when the census was taken, could be!

I copied the following from the St. Helena Parish Register 1823-1894 - Copy in Bft. Library. Under Marriages -

Samuel C. Catherford to Lydia A. Arden, April 28, 1853  
Witnesses, Franklin Taebird and Eliza Clark.

Franklin Taebird is my grandfather and Eliza Clark  
Mrs. Jenkins' Mother. A <sup>1st</sup> ~~relative~~ of my grandfathers, Julia Mary  
Johnson, married Samuel Catherwood Cunningham.

The name was spelled "Catherford" as written but there were many mistakes in that record, which I reported to a library office.

In checking those records later I found a corrected copy, but did not check that spelling. Mr. DeLorme did not copy the

1860 nor the ones prior to 1850, however not worth the effort now.

The census' listed point to the <sup>assumption</sup> fact that James Clark was the name

of Mrs. Jenkins' father and grandfather. The 1860 census and later ones will give us an idea as to when James Clark (29e 39)

and Esther Foy died, if we cannot find out elsewhere.

\* There may be a family connection with the Clark's and Catherwoods.

Note: Jane Cezark evidently had the name Eelen 250 as I have often heard Mrs. Jenkins speak of "Aunt Eelen", and mentioned what a devout Catholic she was and that it was through her efforts that her father (Wm Foy) was baptized just before he died. When I started this work, with that in mind, I wrote to the Church Archives in Charleston, hoping to get date of death and place of burial of Mr. Foy. They kindly sent copies of three certificates of baptism. One for Mrs. Jenkins dated 19 Nov. 1865. She was baptized by The Rev. John Moore, D.D. and her sponsors were George A. Bowman and Mary E. Henry. (Refer to this later). One for Wm Foy age 34, Baptized "sug conditions" (on his death bed) 26 March 1866 by Rev. John Moore, D.D. The third was for Eelen Cezark aged 19 yrs. (no name of parents given) dtd. 16 April 1868 Baptized by The Rev. Jno. O. Schaefer. I thought perhaps a mistake had been made.

Made as to the date of Eelen Clark's certificate as I thought  
she became a Catholic first, the reason probably was that  
having no parents to sponsor her they waited until she  
(became of age (18 is the legal date in SC, or used to be.)

I knew that Mrs Jenkins and her brothers used to  
attend Sunday School at St. Peters Ch. Bpt. where my Father  
and his sisters went, but did not know that she had been baptized.

I wrote to the Archives again asking if a mistake could have  
been made as to the date of Eelen Clark's certificate and  
if they had any records for Charles and Henry Fay.

The answer was in the negative for all questions. This was  
prior to getting the records catalogued etc. If the date of  
baptism for Eelen was 1868 or earlier she would have  
been listed in the 1850 census. In Mrs Jenkins' scrap book,

which she gave me prior to her death, she has a picture of  
the Clark home in Kentucky and under it she has written

"Ancestors of my mother's people" The following names:

Elizabeth ANN Clark; William Clark; Rose ANN Clark; Eleanor  
Clark. The archives of Cathedral in Charleston have now  
been catalogued etc. so they may now have more Fay data. re  
place of birth time or rather date of death etc.

I will contact them once more.

Cezek-Foy Family Dzdz

William Bernard Foy (born France) came to Canada in the 1830's and married Esther Robinson (Robertson?) from England. They embarked for Charleston, S.C. c. 1831<sup>1/2</sup>. He became ill and died enroute. Just before his death he gave to his wife a small "strong box," impressing on her the fact that it contained all of his important papers and that she must not let it get out of her sight. He probably was a political refugee. After Mrs. Foy's arrived in Charleston her son was born (William Bernard Foy Jr.). The family had no early records as to where the widow stayed or where her son was born nor any date as to when they moved to Beaufort. In some way Mrs. Foy lost the box entrusted to her by her husband which, unfortunately, she had never opened.

For some reason Mrs. Jenkins' brother, Henry Foy, seemed to think that William B. Foy was a descendant of Maximilien-Sébastien Foy (born 1724 d 1779) Ham, France. I wrote first to the Archives of Canada - Ottawa, Canada, they had no records. I then wrote to the French Archives, Paris, and a very charming letter, but lacking data of importance dates etc., naturally. They were also unable to help. I then got my French cousin, Coe. Beecon, to write the Mayor of Ham for me, who was quite helpful, Gen. Foy had three sons, they all died in the 1870's, was only given the date of birth of one son, Tiburce, Vicomte Foy, b 26 Aug. 1816. Since my cousin remembers about 25 much English as I do French, he writes me in French and I answer in English, so I got a French teacher in Sarasota to write the Mayor of Ham for more data, after three attempts and no

replies we gave up. I have checked numerous encyclopedias but have found no genealogies. When Uncle Harry Foy's grandson, Henry Foy, was attending Clemson College (Now University) one of his teachers was from France, Henry said he noticed that his professor kept looking at him rather closely and one day he asked him to stay after class. He then asked Henry if he was related or descended from Maximilian Foy as he was the image of a statue of the General in Fontainebleau in the square in front of the castle. He was going to get his wife, who was living there, to send him a picture so he could show it to Henry, but never did. I wish I had known as I have been there. Have you any suggestions as to where we might find the needed information? The names of the sons are.

The Mayor did not mention the name of Maximilien's father but stated he was a military man.

4. Mrs Jenkins never mentioned the first name of Mr. Hale, but did mention  
that he owned a Jewelry Store in Bft. which was later owned by Mr.  
William R. Bristol, which was later bought by his assistant  
Leamon Hale, Leamon (or Lemon as he is known). Lives in the large  
white "mansion" at the west end of Bay Street, he may know Mr Hale's

Name, however, I am not particularly interested, Lemon has  
a number of old pictures of Bft. which might be of interest  
to you and also has some old records and books.

Mr. Hale's parents took Mrs. Jenkins to live with them in  
Wakefield, Mass. When she was very young, she returned  
to Bft. when about sixteen yrs. old. I have often heard  
her speak of the Hale family. Mr. Foy was a conductor on  
the Charleston & Sav. R.R. during the war. I am not too sure of the  
name of the R.R.

5. Mrs. Jenkins always celebrated her birthday on the 30th of June.  
It is not the same as on her Baptismal Certificate, many mistakes  
in copying dates have been made as you know. I do not have ~~dates~~  
dates for her brother Charlie but feel sure he was  
older. Mrs. W<sup>m</sup> J. Lever of Columbia gave me the Bostick date.

Note. Mrs. Jenkins' grandfather owned the house behind Lemon Hale  
on Charles St., now owned by Mr. & Mrs. Gus Frank. At that period  
it was <sup>one</sup> story house and was called "Woodbine Cottage". Mrs.  
Jenkins was born there. I asked Mrs. Stanley to see what date she  
could find when she was in Bft. but she probably did not have time.  
At that period I was trying to find the name of Mrs. Jenkins'  
grandfather, I was under the impression that his name was  
William Clark, some of the family connections insist that he was a  
descendant of "William Clark" brother of George Rogers Clark, which the  
records prove otherwise according to dates. Now that I have  
the census records I know that I was right, and feel sure  
that his name was James. I will give you a brief summary of

the history of the house. The CLARKS probably lost the house during the war. It was bought by Mr. George Holmes who also owned the house where Lemon Haze now lives. He added the second story and lived there for quite sometime. When he became engaged to Miss Hazel, he renovated the house on the Bay and fixed it up beautifully for his lovely young bride. Thereby hangs another tale. The house on the Bay originally belonged to an ELLIOTT, and later bought by a DRINKINS who lost it during the war for many years; it was known as the Holmes house. Mr. Holmes owned a lot of property in Beaufort so you should not have much trouble checking the records. There is a book in the Court House which you probably have seen and which should be of help. "Register of Conveyances Book B." This book started in Nov. 1, 1863, Alexander P. Kitchum was appointed to act as Register of Deeds for Department of South, authorized to make registry of deeds and mortgages etc. (Given to me by Mrs. Stanbury) Mrs. Stanbury was doing some work for me but did not check that book. She did check Tidbird transactions in the City of Bpt. Srsa (Colo) Shultz of Texas, found some family deeds which had been re-recorded, as you know a lot of Bpt. Co. deeds etc. have been destroyed.

Note This may solve the Clark relationship. The figures do NOT work out too well but the ages given in records are not too accurate. Elizabeth could have been 2 bits older or younger at time of death. As I wrote you I do not have more than two numbers of the SCHM VOL. 23. No. 1 JAN 1922 and No. 4 OCT 1922.

I asked for 2cc but was told that Nos 1 and 4 were the only ones available - the others were out of print.

I bought the Marriage and Death Notices compiled by Mr A. S. Sabley, Jr from the Archives in Columbia; I believe that a few more are now available.

Have heard Mrs Jenkins say she was related to the Bowmans, Henrys, Courtneys, DeSaussures. I met Frank DeSaussure of Greenville (now dead) who called her "Cousin Essie" but never thought to ask about the relationship, that was many years ago.
