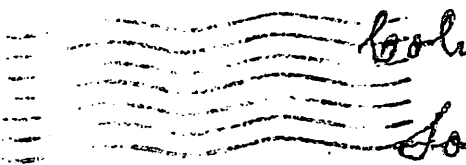
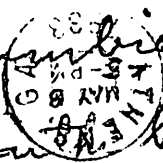

Dear Mr. Clark,

Your letter reached me just as I was leaving Brunswick. I spent two days in Savannah then came to Athens to be with my son for the next few weeks.

Sometime ago I wrote to an old lady in Washington who knows Mr. Bullock and asked if she could give me his address. She answered that she tried several days to get him on the phone, and at last did ask him about the relationship between the Irvines and

Bullochs. He couldn't tell her anything about the Irvines, and she forgot to give me his address. Anyway, I am sure he does not know the connection between Dr. Irvine and Nathaniel. I do not think anyone in this country has discovered the relationship, but the books written by Dr. Bulloch a good while ago give more information as to the Irvine family than any other source discovered by me. He is very old and probably has forgotten the claims made in his books. They are in the Savannah library - the branch at the corner of the Barge park - the side of the building is on Gaston street.

Upstairs in the genealogical department there are several books about the Strobs, Ironies, Bullochs and other families related to the Irvines. Sometime when you go to Savannah it will be worth while for you to examine these books.

Dr. John Irvine's daughter, Anne, (I think) married a Bullough, and the books mentioned give descendants, some of whom you may be able to locate after you have seen these records.

I did not have time last week to go to the library where I saw these books three years ago, but if I ever stay in Savannah long enough I will hunt up the Irvine ancestry. You are apt to see the books before I do, however, for it may be several years before I am down that way again. If I should secure any information in the meantime, I will be glad to pass it on to you.
