GRAVEYARDS -

- Goodwin/Hall The graveyard is looking good. Some plants did not survive the winter and will have to be replaced. Winter storm damage has been cleaned up. As rocks become available, we are lining the walkways. A small box monument has been partially reconstructed. This came with the graves from Nancies Creek Cemetery and it is unknown to whom it belonged. Major fence repairs and painting are still needed.
- Guess About one half of the grounds have been cleared of underbrush and 22 of the known 32 graves uncovered. The fence is in bad condition and will have to be replaced. A detail map has been started.
- Solomon Goodwin Jr. A large oak in the middle of this plot was struck by lightning and will need removing. There is no fence and the plot is badly trashed. Only rough mapping has been done.

HOUSE - Kitchen renovations are progressing with Jim Rule doing all the cabinet work.

GROUNDS - The yard is looking great, with the new sod and grass greening up nicely. The flowers suffered from the winter and drought but are still very pretty.

OPEN HOUSE

The Goodwin House and grounds are now open to family and friends on the third Sunday of each month. Most of the time historian/genealogist Albert Martin will be on hand to conduct tours and answer questions. Records, artifacts and photographs will be on display. Hours 1:00 till 4:00 o'clock unless other arrangements are made.

HISTORY

Letter (GHF D97-0025) from Harris and Emily Goodwin in DeKalb County Ga to father, mother, brother, and sisters in Laurens SC. Note: () indicate unreadable sections of the letter.

"Georgia dekalb December the 13 th 1835 "Dear father mother brother and County sisters god permits me the opertunity of dropping you a few lines to let you know that me and family are in moderate health which I desire to thank god for his blessings hoping where these few lines comes to hand they may find you all enjoying the happy share of the Same blessings. I received your letter that was dated the 25 of November which has rendered me very unhappy to hear of mothers bad health for it seems like it would be terross of sorrow for me in this life if so ordered that we shant meet no more in this world but I trust to the powers above that we will have the pleasure of meeting in health once more in this world if not the world to come I have become in favor of getting to the new () for I believe if mother was to remove she would recover her health completely. I have never got my own consent til this last sumer and I have fully got my content for good land can be had for a toleerable good (). I wrote to you so soon as I received my horse Stateing to you to come without fail and we would buy land. I want you to be certain to so soon as possible and we could buy and I will take all the trouble of your moving upon myself and will see you well first agin if I live and I never will leave you as long as we live for I no the want of friends. Father you can better your self considerable by selling and moving so I don't want you to fail in coming and if you cant come this winter let me no when you can come and when () be looking out for () a place or not. I think that mother would be Better if you would move. I like the () uction of this country tolerably well () so well as I do further out. I have made a very good crop here of corn and cotton my cotton was hurt by the () frost. Solomon I want you to come () if possible and we will select a place together I want See you all very bd So bad that I cannot express it. I have herd from Starling Since Walter (Ceeinector) brought me my horse. I have

swap away my horse for first rate filly for the purpose of Raseing some colts. I want you to let me no as soon as possible what to be doing whether you can come or not this winter. I have nothing more particular But (Remaining) your ()(). Emily Sends her love and compliments to all the family. Cousin Dodgen Send his complements to all the family. My father in law send his respect to all the family.

Dear Sisters I will Drop you few lines to let you know that you are still in my Rememberance yet it is the desires of my heart to be where we can see one another more often than we do the very Sparcity of () men in this country. ... Olly Dodgen Say if he was a younger man he would marry Sarah at the risk of his life. He has got half of the young men in this country declaring they will come to see you both for the ladies he never was acquainted with as fine folks before but I don't often see much of him so farewell Dear Sisters. Harris Goodwin Emily sends her love and respect to you both."

Letter (GHF D97-0031T) from Theophilus in Alabama to his brother Solomon in Laurens Co SC.

December the 17 day 1834 dear Brother I once more imbras this oppertunity of informing you that we are yet in land of the living & injoying a reasonable portion of health for which we ought to be thankful to the Great Giver of all good hoping This will find you all in the same state of health I received your letter by hand of Mr Peirsons which gives me great satisfaction. You wrote you wished me to inform you something about our country. I have very little to say about it at present either good or bad. I and all the the children are very well satisfied & tho we had a little brush of ague and fever this fall but that is a thing of nothing you no wish to know something about the water. There seems to be a plenty all year to make out with tho this branch goes dry in the summer but still there is springs a plenty it apears to be a land of plenty, as to this poor worlds affairs, Religion seems to be very cold in our naborhood at this time (turn over) I have to inform you of

the death of my son Solomon he lost his health on coming to this country and was very porly all the spring and summer until the start of June then was confined to his bed and untill the 16 day of July he departed this life and left a helpless family behind. Tho they are left in a christian land where we hope they will not suffer. Time fails and I come to close with subscribing my yours till death.

EDITORIAL

I am sitting on the porch of the Goodwin House in a rocking chair typing this into my computer. Today is open house, but no visitors. The buzz of street traffic from Peachtree Road and the occasional train traffic from the back seem so out of place. Yet, I remember the same sounds through the seventy plus years I have been associated with this place. The noises seem louder but the traffic is hidden from view. The birds are singing, the squirrels are chattering and cat is stalking. How much like the old times it feels.

We are so indebted to my Grandfather Alfred Martin for rescuing the homestead from outside hands back in 1905 and to Aunt Elisabeth for saving the house from destruction in 1961. I often think how wonderful it would be if we could turn the clock back and have the house back on the hill, but the past can not be undone.

What is important now is to keep the house and cemetery for future generations of our family and others to have a solid connection with their past. My three daughters are the current owners and have dedicated their efforts toward this end. They are making financial sacrifices to protect this bit of our family history and could use some help.

Monies donated to the Foundation are used to do emergency repairs, restoration, cemetery and grounds maintenance. Funds are also needed to keep the archives and history. Unfortunately the IRS in its infinite wisdom did not grant us a C3 designation, so donations are not tax deductible at this time. When funds become available we will reapply.
