Title Education during Reconstruction on Hilton Head and St. Helena Islands

Learning Activities and Assessments (Rubric for Participation)

Students will recreate maps of both islands indicating former plantation sites, praise house sites, and school sites.

Students will participate in a mock debate between "industrial educators" and "classical educators" as it may have occurred in 1870.

Students will discuss the role of religion in education including character education as it was viewed in the 19th century.
