The immigrant progenitor of the South Carolina family was *Daniel JAUDON*, born c. 1683 on the Isle de Ré, Bay of Biscay, France, planter of the Parish of St. Thomas and St. Denis, Berkeley County, and of the Parish of St. James, French Santee, Craven County, died 1739.

Elias Gabriel Jaudon (Daniel,¹ Elias,³ Elias⁹), born 15 May 1772 in Prince William Parish, Granville County, eldest son of Samuel Timothy Elias Jaudon, Jr. (1739-1809) and his wife Mary Hyrne Smith Dixon (1753-1797), married 14 Nov. 1799 Mrs. Sarah Chovin Willingham, born 7 Aug. 1780, daughter of Charles and Sarah (Guérin) Chovin, and widow of Thomas Henry Willingham, born 28 Jan. 1773 in St. James Parish, by whom she had one child: Thomas Henry Willingham (23 Dec. 1798-7 July 1873), planter of Silver Hill Plantation, St. Peter's Parish. Elias Gabriel had 1 July 1795 deed from his father for 292 acres on Jackson's Branch, Salkehatchie River, Prince William Parish, which same he deeded 17 June 1796 to Jacob Rivers of Winton Co., Orangeburg District. By 1810 Elias Gabriel was a planter of St. Peter's Parish, Beaufort District. Sarah Chovin Willingham Jaudon died 30 Dec. 1823 in giving birth to their tenth child. Elias Gabriel Jaudon survived her until 10 March 1826 and was buried beside her in the Robert Cemetery, original site of Black Swamp Baptist Church of which they were members, northeast of Robertville. Their ten children were born in St. Peter's Parish:⁷⁹

Thomas Dixon Jaudon, M.D. (Daniel,¹ Elias,³ Elias⁸), born 7 Nov. 1776 in Prince William Parish, Beaufort District, son of Samuel Timothy Elias Jaudon, Jr. (1739-1809) and his wife, Mary Hyrne Smith Dixon (1753-1797), married c. 1802 Mary Sarah Myrick. In 1810 Dr. Jaudon was practicing medicine in St. Peter's Parish. In 1820 and 1830 he was residing in Prince William Parish. By 1850 he was again residing in St. Peter's Parish where he died. Mrs. Mary Jaudon, widow of Dr. Thomas Dixon Jaudon, died 10 Aug. 1856 in her 71st year, at the home of her son Thomas Jaudon near Savannah, Georgia. She had been a member of Black Swamp Baptist Church, Robertville, for 45 years. Their two sons.⁸¹

James de Bourdeaux Jaudon (Daniel,¹ Elias,³ Elias⁸), born 7 Feb. 1786 in St. Peter's Parish, son of Samuel Timothy Elias Jaudon, Jr. (1739-1809) and his wife Mary Hyrne Smith Dixon (1753-1797). In late 1810 he traveled from South Carolina with Joseph J. Lawton, Benjamin T. D. Lawton and their brother-in-law, Thomas Polhill, Jr., through the Creek Nation of Indians on a Georgia Passport dated 13 Oct. 1810, to Mississippi and returned to South Carolina with them in 1812.⁸² He was a Trustee of the marriage settlement of his sister Judith

Rebecca Jaudon on 1 April 1813 to Thomas Polhill, Jr., widower, and a witness 3 Aug. 1813 at his sister Sarah's 2nd marriage, to Rev. Robert Benjamin Brooks.⁸³ He was Postmaster of Robertville 1816-1819, during which time he married on 22 July 1817 Rachel Elizabeth Polhill, born 7 Jan. 1801, daughter of Rev. Thomas Polhill, born at Bethesda, Ga., 12 Jan. 1760, died 24 Nov. 1814, and his second wife, Mary Anderson who died 10 Jan. 1804. Their only child, Sarah Lucille Jaudon, was born April 1820, died 3 June 1821, aged 14 months at Black Swamp.⁸⁴ According to various Savannah newspapers of the early 1820s James de B. Jaudon was a grocer in Savannah in partnership with a Mr. Brown and later with Mr. Crowell; he was City Constable in 1825. He established a partnership with Mr. Huguenin in factoring and later with James Porcher. He died intestate 21 Oct. 1834 in Savannah and James Porcher was Administrator of his estate. His principal heir was Mrs. Thomas S. (Julia Brooks) Gillison (1817-1845), daughter of his sister Sarah Jaudon Brooks.⁸⁵

Peter Jaudon (Daniel,¹ Elias,³ James⁹), born 17 Dec. 1791, son of James Elias Jaudon (1745-1807) and his 4th wife, Eleanor Sarah Anderson (1771-1855), married at Robertville c. 1817 Mary Meller Singleton (25 Jan. 1797-c. 1832), daughter of Thomas Benjamin Singleton, born 1769, and his wife Elizabeth Anne Robert (1772-1832), daughter of John and Elizabeth (Dixon) Robert. Peter and his brother Benjamin had a saddler's shop in Robertville.⁸⁶ He died 17 Dec. 1824 and was buried in the Robert Cemetery. His widow, Mary Meller (Singleton) Jaudon married (2) c. 1830 Elias James William Josias Jaudon (1805-1887).⁸⁷ The children of Peter and Mary Meller (Singleton) Jaudon were:

Benjamin Jaudon (Daniel,¹ Elias,³ James⁹), born 11 Nov. 1795 in Robertville, son of James Elias Jaudon (1745-1807) and his 4th wife, Eleanor Sarah Ander-

son (1771-1855), married 18 May 1826 at Robertville, Sarah Thirza Polhill, born at Robertville 2 Aug. 1809, daughter of Thomas Polhill, Jr. and his 1st wife, Thirza Elizabeth Lawton (17 Sept. 1787-3 Dec. 1811), daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Robert) Lawton of Mulberry Grove Plantation, St. Peter's Parish. For many years he was a prominent merchant and planter in Robertville where their 15 children were born. His son-in-law, the Rev. Dr. John H. Luther, wrote: "It was the most beautiful home I ever knew. Ben Jaudon and Sarah Polhill were an affectionate and loyal pair. He was of Huguenot origin and she belonged to an old English family by the name of Lawton. She was educated in New York where she lived for three years with her aunt. There were family prayers morning and evening with Bible reading. The most cherished ancestors were those Huguenots who for conscience sake fled to America from France in the 17th century where they might worship God in freedom and in truth." He further described what he saw to his daughter Zollie who wrote: "The ground around the house was covered with fine white sand and kept spotless by incessant sweeping. The drive from the main road ran through tall pines, dividing just before it reached the house, to encircle a fenced garden of flowers and household herbs. Beyond spread cotton and corn fields, pasture lands, barns and servant houses, sugar press, fruit trees and a score of accessories necessary to a self-sustaining community such as a Southern plantation."

In 1857 Ben Jaudon moved to Kansas City, Mo., where his eldest son was already practicing medicine, and was joined by most of his children and their families. During the Confederate War in 1863 the family was exiled by Special Order No. 11 to Quincy, Ill., where Sarah Thirza (Polhill) Jaudon died 8 Dec. 1863 and was buried, her body being removed to Palmyra, Mo., after the War. The Bible of Benjamin and Sarah Thirza (Polhill) Jaudon, a prized possession of their great-granddaughter, Lily Frances Stafford, records many dates and much information concerning this family. Benjamin Jaudon died 27 Jan. 1870 in Kansas City, Mo.; their children were:⁸⁸

7. Anne ("Tannie") Mathilda Jaudon, born 4 Sept. 1837, grew up "longing to become a missionary in some foreign field" and it was understood that she would have several years training in a northern boarding

school as her sisters had enjoyed. But in July 1853 the Rev. John Hill Luther, born 21 June 1824 in Warren, Rhode Island, son of Joseph and Nancy (Marvell — she rejoiced in her Huguenot origins) Luther, who had graduated *summa cum laude* from Brown University 1847, member of Phi Beta Kappa, and from Newton Seminary 1850, arrived in July 1853 as pastor of Black Swamp Baptist Church and headmaster of Robertville Academy. Although 13 years her senior, he fell in love with Tannie and in the absence of Rev. Joseph A. Lawton who had promised to marry them, the Rev. John M. Ashburn officiated 3 Aug. 1854 "just as the sun was setting over the pine trees. The congregation was large and the bridal supper as rich a repast as I have ever seen. Even the Negroes who seemed to fill the yard were remembered," the happy groom recorded. Their children were:

- a. Mary Norada Luther, born 1855 in Robertville, died 16 months later and was buried in Pendleton, S. C., Churchyard where her father had been called as pastor. The bereaved couple moved to Kansas City to be near her parents and in 1858 opened the Young Ladies Seminary in a two-room log cabin with the help of Rev. J. M. Ashburn. With \$5000.00 which Anne received from the Jaudon estate, they built a three-story brick building which soon housed more than one hundred students.
- b. Annie Luther, born 20 March 1859, attended Lexington College, Mo., and in 1878 taught mathematics at Baylor College, Independence, Tex., where she married 21 Oct. 1880 Rev. William B. Bagby, going with him in 1881 as the first Southern Baptist missionaries to Brazil where they served for 60 years. Their daughter Helen married W. C. Harrison and was the author of *The Bagbys of Brazil*.
- c. Charlie Melanthon Luther, born 30 June 1862 at Miami, Mo., where his father had been called to a pastorate after "redlegs" burned his home and he lost the Seminary. Exiled to Quincy, Ill., with the Jaudon, Ashburn and Smith families, Charlie died there in Dec. 1863.
- d. Alice Zollikoffer Luther, born 28 Feb. 1865 in Palmyra, Mo., where her father had accepted a pastorate, was called "Zollie" because of her father's admiration for Polish Gen. Zollikoffer who helped the Confederate Army. There Rev. J. Luther began *Missouri Baptist Journal* which evolved into *The Central Baptist* in 1867. Zollie married 18 Dec. 1890 William Goodrich Jones of the Temple National Bank, Temple, Texas, son of John Maxwell and Henrietta (Offenbach) Jones. Their daughter, Doris Goodrich Jones, has compiled the *Memoirs of John Hill Luther and Anne Jaudon Luther*.

- e. Sallie Luther, born 30 Oct. 1867 in Palmyra, died July 1870 in St. Louis, Mo., where her father was Editor of *The Central Baptist* until 1876. William Jewell College, Liberty, Mo., conferred the degree of Doctor of Divinity on Rev. John Luther 29 June 1871 as a "foremost educator" and he was elected a trustee of Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville, Ky.
- f. John Hill Luther, Jr., born 4 Oct. 1873 in St. Louis, died 22 Aug. 1891 in Belton, Texas.

In 1878 Dr. Luther accepted the presidency of Baylor Female College, Independence, Texas, of which Anne Jaudon Luther was to serve as Matron for 13 years. In 1886 they moved with the College to Belton, Texas, where they resided on the first floor of Luther Hall until he resigned the presidency in 1891. They settled in Temple, Texas, where Dr. Luther organized Memorial Baptist Church and Anne Jaudon Luther died 21 Aug. 1894. She was buried in North Belton Cemetery, "her faith in God remarkable for its simplicity of strength." Dr. Luther died at the home of their daughter Annie Luther Bagby 16 July 1903 in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

Charles Jaudon (Daniel,¹ Elias,³ James⁹), born 16 October 1799 "Wednesday half past 2 o'clock A.M. and baptized the Wednesday following by the Rev. M. Thomas Didimus Bladen," as recorded in the Family Bible, sixth child of *James Elias Jaudon* (1745-1807) and his 4th wife, *Eleanor Sarah Anderson* (1771-1855). Charles Jaudon married (1) c. 1820 Miss Wall who died without posterity.⁹⁰ He married (2) 14 Feb. 1822 Elizabeth Anne Robinson who died 14 July 1823; their one child:

1. James Robinson Charles Jaudon, born Robertville 2 March 1823,⁹¹ married 4 Aug. 1861 Springfield, Ga., Emma E. Heriot. They made a joint will in June 1892 in Hampton Co., S. C., leaving their entire estate

to his youngest half-brother, Augustus R. Jaudon, on condition that he assist them in their "declining years" if needed. They had no children. Charles Jaudon married (3) c. 1825 Susan Stokes, born c. 1803, died 1 Feb. 1845 and was buried in Robertville Cemetery. Their 7 children:

Charles Jaudon married (4) 31 July 1845 Ann Christiana Blount (1826-27 July 1857).⁹² In 1850 Charles and his son Henry were in business as merchants in Robertville. The 7 children of Charles and Ann (Blount) Jaudon were:

Charles Jaudon married (5) 16 Dec. 1857 in Springfield, Ga., Amanda L. Mallory (c. 1830-1 July 1867), daughter of Horace and Anna (Rodgers) Mallory. In 1860 Charles Jaudon was Postmaster of Robertville and employed Thomas Riley and Amos Brunson in his general merchandising business. The 2 children of Charles and Amanda (Mallory) Jaudon were:

After the 1867 death of his 5th wife and their daughter, Charles Jaudon moved from Robertville to Effingham Co., Ga., and devoted himself to farming. He married (6) 15 April 1868 in Springfield, Ga., Mrs. Mary Eliza (Rushing) Jaudon Brown (1815-13 Oct. 1879), widow of James Josiah Jaudon (1814-1840) and of James C. Brown of St. Peter's Parish. Charles Jaudon, having outlived six wives, died 16 June 1884 in Effingham Co., Ga., where many of his descendants still reside.

Elias James William Josias Jaudon (Daniel,¹ Elias,³ James⁹), born 4 Feb. 1805, "baptized 14 April 1805 by Rev. M. Fraser on Easter Sunday" as recorded in the Family Bible, youngest child of *James Elias Jaudon* (1745-1807) and his 4th wife, *Eleanor Sarah Anderson* (1771-1855). He lived the greater part of his life in the Robertville area as *William Jaudon*, planter and teacher. He married (1) 13 June 1829 Mrs. *Mary Meller* (Singleton) *Jaudon*, widow of his brother *Peter Jaudon* who had died 17 Dec. 1824. Their one child:

1. *Mary E. Jaudon*, born 1830, married 18 March 1855 in Lawtonville, Professor *Chester M. Root*. The Roots moved to Kansas City, Mo., with her uncle, *Benjamin Jaudon* (1795-1870). Their two known children:
 - a. *Ida Root*, born 1856 in Lawtonville, died 1857 in Kansas City.
 - b. *William C. Root*, born c. 1859 in Kansas City.
 Professor *Chester M. Root* was teaching music in Kansas City in 1860.⁹⁵ in charge of vocal music at the Young Ladies Seminary founded by the Rev. *John H. Luther*.

William Jaudon married (2) c. 1833 *Susan Porter* in Robertville where all their children were born. *Susan Porter Jaudon*, born c. 1810, died 19 May 1859 in Savannah, Ga., while visiting their daughter, *Emma (Jaudon) Askew*,⁹⁶ after which *William Jaudon* left his two youngest children in the *Askew* household and moved to Jacksonville, Fla., to live with his eldest daughter, *Caroline (Jaudon) Flinn*.⁹⁷ In Jacksonville where he was employed as a clerk, he married (3) 18 Nov. 1860 *Rebecca Winter* who was born in S. C. in 1815.⁹⁸ In 1870 *William* and *Rebecca (Winter) Jaudon* were in Screven Co., Ga., with his daughter, *Frances (Jaudon) Taylor*, and in 1880 were living with his son, *J. Wheeler Jaudon*.⁹⁹ *William Jaudon* died 18 Nov. 1887 in Savannah, Ga., and was buried in Laurel Grove Cemetery. The seven children of *William* and *Susan (Porter) Jaudon* were:

BENJAMIN THEMISTOCLES D'ION LAWTON (Daniel,¹ Sarah,⁴ Sarah (Robert) Lawton¹⁴), born at Mulberry Grove Plantation, Robertville, son of Joseph Lawton (1753-1815) and his wife Sarah Robert (1755-1839), married 16 June 1803 at her father's home on the corner of Broughton and West Broad Streets, Savannah, Ga., Jane Mosse, born 27 Dec. 1783 on St. Helena's Island, S. C., fourth of the seven daughters of Dr. George Mosse (1742-1808) and his second wife, Dorothy Phoebe Norton. In Oct. 1810 on a passport issued by the Governor of Georgia, the Benjamin Lawtons, his brother Joseph J. Lawton, their sister Thirza Eliza Lawton and her husband Thomas Polhill and James B. Jaudon, traveled by oxcart from St. Peter's Parish across Georgia through the Creek Nation of Indians to the vicinity of present Natchez, Mississippi, where they intended to continue their planting activities. But finding the Indians unfriendly, they returned to St. Peter's Parish in 1812 when Benjamin Lawton purchased extensive lands ten miles northwest of Robertville near the Republican Church on Orangeburg Road and founded the Village of Lawtonville. He established Lawtonville Academy with George Rhodes (1802-1881), stepson of his younger brother, Rev. Winborn Asa Lawton, as its first Headmaster. By 1826 Pipe Creek Baptist Church had moved to the Republican Church which was re-named Lawtonville Baptist Church. He died in Albany, Ga., 18 April 1846 while visiting his youngest daughter; his grave there marked by an extant full-length stone. A cenotaph was also erected to his memory in Lawtonville Cemetery. Jane (Mosse) Lawton died 23 May 1857 and was buried in Lawtonville Cemetery.¹⁰⁶ Their children were:¹⁰⁷

PAUL JAUDON, III (Daniel,¹ Paul,⁵ Paul¹⁵), planter, was baptized 25 May 1773 in the Parish of St. Thomas and St. Denis, son of Paul Jaudon, Jr. and his wife, Martha Guérin. He appears in the 1800 Winyah Census and in 1810 was planting in Georgetown District. His 15 July 1814 will names his wife Elizabeth (surname unknown) and children. On 13 Feb. 1811 Paul Jaudon gave Isaac Jaudon his promissory note for \$250; on 23 Sept. 1814 Isaac Jaudon sued the Estate of Paul Jaudon, Samuel Perdriau & Gabriel G. Glaze, Administrators, and Elizabeth Glaze, wife of Gabriel G. Glaze and widow of Paul Jaudon. The matter was amicably settled by 15 Jan. 1818.

ELIAS GABRIEL JAUDON, Jr. (Daniel,¹ Elias,³ Elias,⁸ Elias G.¹⁷), born 24 Jan. 1806 in St. Peter's Parish, son of Elias Gabriel and Sarah (Chovin) Jaudon, as a young man was Manager of Calibogia Plantation on Hilton Head Island for Mrs. Martha Sarah Stoney Barksdale. On 17 Dec. 1835 in Chatham Co., Ga., he married Jane Isabel Harris; in 1840 he was a planter in St. Peter's Parish. Shortly thereafter they moved to Florida. In 1844 a small, brick Baptist Church was built on what is now Myrtle Avenue, between Adams and Duval Streets, in Jacksonville, the lot adjacent to which he gave for use as a cemetery. It was damaged during the Confederate War era and was not used thereafter. In 1945 its graves were moved to Edgewood Cemetery where Elias Gabriel is now buried. His 24 Jan. 1870 will dated Ellisville, Columbia Co., Florida, left his Magnolia Plantation on St. Johns River, Duval Co., to his wife and divided various lands among their children. He died ~~9 Nov. 1872~~¹¹⁴ or 29 Nov. 1871;¹¹⁵ Mrs. Jane Isabel Harris Jaudon died 10 Nov. 1879 in Jacksonville. ^{Columbia}
