Dear Robert,

We had a wonderful time in Florida, thank you, much too short as usual. Sounds as if you and Cora are very busy as usual. I hope I answer all your questions= but first to Paul Jaudon #26. I have recently made the acquaintance of Mabel Pace, we have a Nungezer line in common. Then I found that she has a McDonald line, and has done a lot of work on it. Her great grandmother that died in 1939, told Mabel's father, that Eleanor McDonald ~~and~~ had married a Jaudon-that is all she knows, but it ties in with what we have. Paul Jaudon IV in Georgetown 1830, then Ellen Jaudon in Georgetown 1840, Ellen could be short for Eleanor, then the later census. Mabel has that George K. McDonald's wife ~~for~~ was Emma Maria and that ties in with the census I found also. Will make a copy of that to enclose. Maybe this McDonald info will jog Martha Burns memory... or be of interest. Will enclose a family sheet.

Re #23 my William - In the Index to Compiled Records of Confederacy for Florida I found that he was a Private in Capt. Pickett's Co., Florida Cavalry. As was Henry. Elias G. was a 2nd Lt. in Co. J, 8th Fla. Infantry. These are sons of #28.

Have not put down much on Confederacy as it is confusing and have not straightened it out, duplications from different spellings, etc. Don't know when I can get up to Columbia, to check.

Also Re #23 - under his 4th child Anza: I found her <sup>widowed</sup> husband George W. Berry in 1900 Orlando, Orange Co., Fla. 64yr, agent for Oil Co., with their daughter Nettie (Nov 1872) 28 yr Single, Seamstress. (p31B #502-530)

Elias G., Jr.- from Edwards, Grave Markers of Duval Co. p52 "A few years after the church was built, Elias G. Jaudon bought a piece of ground adjoining the church and donated it to the church for a burial ground. The church ~~and~~ building was partially wrecked from the fighting around it ~~and~~ during the War...and was never again used by the congregation. Of those buried there only three stones remain and only two of them is the inscription legible. In 1945, due to encroaching business, the city gave permission for these three graves to be reinterred at Edgewood Cemetery. (Elias G., and dau Susan Elvira)

On the numbering - I agree with the #57-64 for Martha Ann's children #31... but what about under #32 Mary Hyrne Jaudon, I have more on Susan Elizabeth Perry... #65
