He hecame first lieutenant in 1892 and aptain in 1899. He retired from the army as major of infantry in 1908 on account of ill health contracted in a campaign against the Indians in the Far West. Major Lawton served in the Spanish American War, having been actively engaged in the Porto Rico campaign. In the Philippine insurrection he commanded a column at the Battle of Bud Dajo, which resulted in the destruction of the last Moro stronghold.

He was active in relief work, and had charge of transporting Americans, who at that time had crowded into Switzerland, to France and England, where they took ship for home.
