FOREWORD by Sophronia McCroskey

It is a task of no small proportions to compile the genealogy of a family whose known record in America goes back over two hundred years. Had it not been for the perhaps unconscious historic vision of a few souls who saw the value of accurate records, or of some others who merely saw the value of records, our task would have been still more difficult.

An effort has been made to contact members of every family descended from Johannes Jost Stolp. If we have failed to secure such it has been because addresses were not known or letters to those able to give information, have remained unanswered. The work has extended over a period of several years and consists of intensive work by a number of persons.

The first of those we would mention is Caroline Stolp Johnson, daughter of Joseph G. Stolp. Her work included travel and research work in Europe, study in Holland, Sweden and Germany, that brought forth the Saga, clearly showing the origin of the name; letters written to German and Swedish Ambassadors here in America to verify her findings in various ways, also the establishment of the Dutch line of ancestors. Also through the kindness of her sons, Harold Stolp Johnson and Dr. Redford K. Johnson, the diaries and other records of their grandfather Joseph G. Stolp, dating back to 1837 were furnished for our use. At the completion of the work they will be placed in the archives of the Aurora Historical Society for preservation.

Of great value was the data compiled by Ella Stolp Carlisle and given to us by her niece, Fannie Hopkins Peffers. This gave a most complete record of the early branches of the family and must have required much study and research.

Another who contributed extensively to the material that has been collected was Prof. Charles Henry Thompson, formerly of Massachusetts State Agricultural College at Amherst, Mass. His work was in the interest of his niece, Nellie M. Thompson, who was the daughter of Alice Stolp, descended from Frederick Stolp through his son, William.

The present writer's efforts have consisted of extensive research in the Aurora Public Library, Aurora City Hall, Aurora Beacon News files, records at the Court House at Geneva and Wheaton, files of the Wheaton newspaper office, Histories of Kane and Dupage Counties. Cemeteries at Spring Lake, Aurora, West Aurora, Montgomery, Eola, Lombard, Wheaton and Hobron, Indiana, have been visited and records secured both from caretakers and monuments.

Any statements made have been carefully checked and verified to the best of our ability.

We wish to mention courteous response to letters of inquiry from Amherst College, Mass., Oberlin College, Ohio and the Adjutant General at Washington, D.C., who assisted in establishing the war record of Lucius Stolp.

Professor Thompson and niece spent much time looking up records at Claverack, N.Y., visiting the cemetery and securing records from the Krum Dutch Reformed Church there. From his letter we quote:

"The old church building where the Stolps first attended is still in excellent shape and still used. It was built in 1766. The Stolps lived some distance east and north of Claverack, in what is now North Hillsdale. Their community afterwards had a church of their own, called the Krom, or North Hillsdale Church. The Krom family was numerous there as also were the Van Douson families. This Krom Church and building has long since perished, but we found the place where it formerly stood and the grave-yard next to it. It is in this yard we found the stone marking the grave of Miss Gertrite Stolp. There were many other graves marked only by the rough stones taken from the hillside and uncarved. Some of these were probably Stolps but I know of no way of ascertaining the facts now. The country all about is now deserted."

Thanks are also extended to Charles Pierce Burton, of Aurora, for certain records and pamphlets loaned us and to John W. Soars for use of the DuPage County History, and those members of each family who have cooperated in supplying us with their family records, some of which have required a great deal of work and research.

It is because we are proud having descended from such brave and worthy ancestors that this history and genealogy has been written and we trust that all who read it may feel a glow of pride at the heritage that is theirs.

In the long research that has been made few records are found of great wealth accumulated, but faithfulness, integrity and honest endeavor prove our right as worthy descendants of those Stolps.

As we finish this in 1943, it is with the hope that others may carry on where we have left off, or that those whose records are not completely filled out will see that it is. Also if desired it may be sent to us to be included.

Among the papers sent to us by Harold Stolp Johnson was this article on Genealogies written some years ago by his mother, Caroline Stolp Johnson. It expresses most beautifully the hopes, labors and perplexities that awaited us in trying to carry on what she and others had begun.

"Whoever digs down to the roots of his family tree for proof of half-known facts about his people, is sure to encounter obstructions and perplexities, for he will find many of the roots sapless, or broken or dead.

"Without full records much of the real strength and significance of a family is lost in a baffling obscurity. The line of "Bogots" may be fairly unbroken, but unless there have been chroniclers and anecdotists along the way, special characteristics and the unique contribution of the family to the common life must remain a dull, unsolved puzzle.

"With age and experience our interest in heredity and historical perspective grows more keen. We have lost our horizons if we fail to look back to our ancestors as we try to look forward to our posterity. The spirit of the old is in the new. Our father's fathers had inspirations and emotions like ours. They too knew wrong and sorrow, success and failure, with bursts of happiness and flashes of inspiration which led the way to heroic moments. No family history, even if on the upper level, is a smooth golden brocade; it will be found shot through and through with rough, coarse threads. But often when there is no luster, there may be good texture.

"We have no cult of ancestor worship like the Chinese. Their acute consciousness of family gives them a sense of immortality, an awareness of the continuity and essential unity of family life. More of such respect for the aged in our country and we should have less need of fantastic pension schemes.

"There are aspiring Americans who, by aid of an inspired genealogist can trace a wavering line back to William the Conqueror, or even to King David, but even those who make humbler search for worthy ancestors cannot escape the satirist. John G. Saxe laughs boisterously at those who seek much unearned distinction -

Depend upon it my snobbish friend,
Your family thread you can't ascend
Without good reason to apprehend
You may find it waxed at the farther end
By some plebeian vocation!
Or worse than that, your boasted line
May end in a loop of stronger twine
That troubled some worthy relation.

"It is indeed a desirable thing to be well descended" said Plutarch, "But the glory belongs to our ancestors."

STOLP SAGA by Caroline Stolp Johnson

In the Fourth century while vandals were ravishing and ransacking the northern reaches of the Scandinavian wilderness, there lived a large landowner in the fertile protected country near Stockholm. This Dr. Mür, a man of wealth and generosity, had for a manager of his large estate, the man who was our accredited ancestor. Dr. Mür having no family, when nearing death, summoned his steward-manager and told him of the gift of his estate and fortune in acknowledgement of his faithful service. "You have been the support of my wall and with this fortune I give you the name of Stolp." (Mür one knows without great philological knowledge, means wall. Stolp means prop or up-holding post.) There were three sons in the steward's family. After a time one went to Finland, one remained in the vicinity of Stockholm, and the third crossed the Baltic Sea to found the present large, fortified city of the name of Stolp in Germany.

ORIGIN OF ANCESTRY by Caroline Stolp Johnson

As there has been a certain confusion in some minds as to whether the Stolps are of German or Dutch origin, I can clear away that doubt by giving a brief genealogy, beginning with Johann Jost Stolp who came to this country in 1753, settling in Claverack (Dutch for "stretch of clover") with another Dutch family who came on the same ship. Johann Jost, born in 1706, came with his wife, who was the daughter of Pastor Bogardus, a Dutch minister in the small town of Dietz, birthplace of the Duke of Orange.

Pastor Bogardus was a kinsman of Everardus, the first dominie in New York City during the Dutch administration. Dominie Bogardus married late in life Anneke Jans, who owned the famous Bowerie, now the long disputed Trinity Church property.

Johann Jost Stolp brought with his wife their twelve year old son Johann Pieter, who during the long sea voyage formed an enduring friendship with the young son, Joseph who was six years old, of their ship-mates Stoll, of the other Dutch family of Stoll.

Further evidence is produced by the research work of Prof. C. H. Thompson, of the Amherst Agricultural College. He visited the Krum Dutch reformed Church at Claverack, N.Y., and secured much valuable information which has been incorporated in our records. S.H.C.

In these records we find:

Karelough Stolp, head of a family belonging to the congregation of the Reformed Dutch Church in Hillsdale **** *2 communicants, 2 "souls" in the family.

On a marble headstone in the East Claverack or Krum Church burying ground we find the following inscription:

"In memory of Gertrite Stolp, who died Jan. 31, AD 1826 in the 83 year of her age.

Hail glorious glorious gospel heavenly light wheroby
We live with comfort and with comfort die
and view beyond this gloomy scene the tomb
A life of endless happiness to come.

From "New York in the Revolution as Colony and State" by James A. Roberts, Comptroller. Second Edition. Albany, N.Y. 1898, page 115, we learn that:

Gerlough Stolp and Peter Stolp were privates in the Albany County Militia, Eighth Regiment, under Col. Robert van Rensselaer.

(This Gerlough is the same as Gerlach and Gerloch Stolp

In "State of New York. Report of the State Historian. Colonial Series." Vol. 2, page 865, we find

Charles Stolp was a private in Capt. Jeremiah Hogeboom's Company of Militia in 1767. In the same Company was Dirrick Smith, who was probably the same Derrik or Dirk Smit who married Katrina Stolp

At the time of the First U.S. Census, 1790, there lived at Claverack, N.Y., Gotlieb Stolp and his wife.

GENEALOGY OF STOLP FAMILY

First Generation - JOHANN JOST STOLP (1)

The following is a copy of writing in an old hymn book, dated 1652.

"Johannes Frederica Beggardy - natus year 1657, the 28th January Johann Jost Stolp from Bomerick (or Cammerick) Rhine in Nausau Dieck (or Dietz) Germany, born A.D. 1706 - died Oct. 23, 1771 in Claverack N.Y., U.S.A. aged 65 years. Maria Beggardis, wife of the above (and daughter of Johannes Frederick Beggardis, a minister of the Gospel in Germany and widow of Frederick Flick) was born A.D. 1715 and died Oct. 14, 1788 at Claverack, N.Y., U.S.A. Johannes Peter, son of Johann Jost and Maria Stolp, married Catherine Chrysler, Daughter of Wilhelmus and Showers Catherine Chrysler. Johann Peter Stolp was twelve years old when he came to America, married when thirty years old and had seven children, and died at Marcollus, N.Y., Sept. 8, 1826, aged eighty-five years."

The above record shows a difference in spelling of the name Beggardis, elsewhere wirtten Beggardy or Bogardis. Another record states that Mrs. Maria Bo,ardis, wife of Johannes Jost Stolp, and daughter of Frederick Bogardis, minister of the Gospel in Germany and widow of Fradorick Flick, was born in 1702. All these records are supposed to have their origin in the same old family Bible, now thought to be in the possession of Mr. Arthur W. Marlette. Evidently errors have crept into the copying of the records. Nassau-Dietz was the ancient Nassau now the greater part of Weisbaden in Prussia, Germany. From various records on hand it is surmised that the following were children of the above Johann Jost and Maria. Pieter, our ancestor, is definitely recorded as his son. The order of their birth is not determined.

Second Generation - JOHANNES PIETER STOLP (2) son of Johann Jost

Johannes Pieter Stolp born in 1741, married about 1771 to Catherine daughter of Wilhelmus and Slaus Catharine Chrysler. She dies in Caughnawaga, N.Y., April 1803 aged about 52 years. He died at Marcollus, N.Y. Sept. 8, 1826, aged 85 years. Another copy of the record in the Stolp family Bible gives the name Showers Catharine Chrysler instead of Slaus or Slos Catharine. In the Claverack Church records the last name is recorded Kreisler and Kreissler. Peter Stolp Sr. (Johannes Pieter) was a private in the Albany county Militia 8th regiment N.Y., under Col. Robert Van Rensselaer, during the Revolution. Gerlough (probably his brother) was also in the same regiment. Reference: "New York in the Revolution as Colony and State" by James Roberts, Comptroller/ 2nd Edition 1898, Albany N.Y., page 115.

SECOND GENERATION - JOHANNES PIETER STOLP (2) continued

At the time of the taking of the first census of the United States in 1790 Peter Stolp (Johannes Pieter) was living in Hillsdale N.Y. and his family then consisted of the father, mother, four sons and two daughters. Hillsdale was originally East Claverack. (The record of Peter's Rev. War service is sufficient to establish membership in the D.A.R.) Peter Stolp was a private in Capt. Johann Hogeboom's company of militia. The document was signed by Johannus Hobeboom, Capt., at Claverack, N.Y., May 13, 1767 and by this document it appears he was in the French and Indian Wars. Peter was Elder in the Krum or Hillsdale Dutch Reformed Church. In 1776 he signed his name with an "x" indicating his inability to write. The children of Peter and Catherine were all born in Claverack, N.Y., and were as follows:

THIRD GENERATION - GEORGE STOLP (3) son of Johannes Pieter (2)

George Stolp was born Feb. 4, 1775 at Claverack, N.Y., and died Aug. 25, 1843 at the home of his son Joseph, Aurora, Ill., and is buried in the West Aurora Cemetery. He married Catherine Stall Oct. 16, 1798 at Caughnewaga, N.Y., who was born in 1775 and died May 27, 1851 at Aurora, Ill. Their Children as follows:

- JOHN (4) Born July 8, 1799 Johnstown, Montgomery Cty.
- MARY (POLLY) (4) born 1801 Johnstown, N.Y., married Mr. Fuller
- PETER (4) Born March 2, 1803 at Johnstown, N.Y., married Sophronia Andrews about 1830 or 1831 and who died July 3, 1871. Peter died Aug. 1864
- NANCY (4) Born May 2, 1805, married Mr. Stillman Fuller
- CATHERINE (4) BORN Oct. 15, 1807, married Albert Miller
- RACHEL (4) Born Feb. 23, 1809 and Died Dec. 23, 1826 at Marcellus, N.Y.
- JOSEPH (4) Born Aug. 16, 1812, married Temperance Dustin who died Aug. 2, 1855 at Aurora
- ELIZABETH (4) Born Oct. 2, 1814 married Mr. J. Warren Tri
- MARGARET (4) Born June 2, 1817 married Albert Miller
- SARAH (4) Born Aug. 15, 1820 married Solomon Andrews

NOTE: The Fourth Generation and on will be carried out in detail in so far as our information covers.

It is interesting to know that Catherine Stall's ancestors came on the same boat from Holland as Johann Jost. Their eldest son John came to Illinois about 1835 and settled at Big Woods, near Eola. Their youngest son Joseph, came in 1837 and settled in Aurora. He sent for his father and mother who came about 1836

THE STOLPS AS PIONEERS

Our first record of the Stolps as pioneers naturally goes back to Johann Jost Stolp, who came to America in 1753 when the country was still new with no comforts or facilities. His son, Johann Peter was with him. He settled with his family and other members of the ships company, in the Dutch colony at Claverack, N. Y.

In 1833, Frederick Stolp, son of Johann Peter, then fifty-two years old, walked all the way to Illinois from his home at Pultneyville, N. Y. After looking for a home here, he walked all the way back to New York. He brought his family back with him in 1834, this time coming by wagon and settled at Big Woods. John Stolp (B. 7/6/1799) son of George Stolp evidently came to Illinois about 1835. He also settled at Big Woods, near what is now Eola.

From the "History of Kane County" we quote as follows: "Among the farmers who were residing in the vicinity of Aurora in 1837 and who traded at that point, were --- Frederick Stolp, Addison Albee, David Crane, Joseph Stolp, Harrison Albee, Henry Stolp, John Stolp."

"Joseph Stolp, Sr. from Wayne County, New York, came to Aurora with his wife in February 1836. He purchased the Southworth claim (on the Batavia Road) for \$1500.00 and continued to reside upon it. Mr. Stolp was born in Columbia County, N.Y. Together with his brother Frederick who had arrived a year previous, he took up a claim of 300 acres."

Quoting also from the same book, "Joseph G. Stolp, one of Aurora's early settlers who has linked his name permanently and prominently with that of the cities history, was born in Marcellus, N. Y. Aug. 16, 1812. He lived with his parents on the farm until 1820 when he was "bound out" or apprenticed to learn the woolen manufacturing business with one B.N. Parsons of Marcellus, with whom he remained as apprentice until 1833 and afterward as a journeyman until 1837. In the spring of the latter year he started for Chicago, Illinois, via the Erie Canal and Lakes, taking twenty-one days to make the trip, and walked from Chicago to Aurora, where he arrived June 12, 1837 and at once commenced erecting a building on Stolp's Island in which to put in wool carding and cloth dressing machinery. Before his coming to Aurora his uncle Frederick Stolp, had, by agreement, taken up a claim to the land on the island for Joseph G. in 1835 and when it came into market in 1842 he received a title in fee to it from the United States government for \$12.72. (There is a copy of this Grant in the Historical Society, also a copy of his marriage license.) In the fall of 1837 his buildings were completed and he began business, continuing in the same location until 1849 when he erected the large woolen mill a few doors west of the City Hall on Stolp Island, which mill he occupied until 1887 when he leased it for other purposes. Nearly all the buildings on Stolp Island belonged to him or his children to whom he had given it. He donated the land on which the City Hall, the Memorial Bldg and the Y.M.C.A. Bldg were erected and in the construction of the present bridges he paid more for their construction than any other citizen. Mr. Stolp was one of the largest tax payers; for many years his

school tax alone was \$600.00 per annum in East Aurora. He was married at Naperville, Ill., June 12, 1839 to Temperance Dustin, daughter of Ebenezer Dustin of Plattsburgh, N.Y. He lost his wife by death in June 1855, she leaving five children as follows: Allen W., Myron G., Elnora O (now wife of Maj. Samuel B. Sherer), Cleora, widow of Pliny L. Haskell, and Caroline T., wife of Joseph F. Johnson of Chicago. Mr. Stolp was afterward married in the winter of 1858 to Isabella Miller who died Feb. 19, 1883 leaving no children."

An interesting incident in the life of Joseph G. Stolp is the fact that B. N. Parsons to whom he was apprenticed, had promised that he would see that Joseph had a certain amount of schooling each year. This he failed to do and at the end of his apprenticeship Joseph asked for the time which should have been spent in school. This he received and it was spent in intensive school work in a nearby school.

He was a man of high principle and integrity. He was strongly opposed to the liquor traffic and in every deed to property given or sold the clause was inserted forbidding the sale of liquor forever upon that property, with one exception - that of the Y.M.C.A. In later years when the Y.M.C.A. was obliged to move to larger quarters the only saloon on the island was located in that building and that, as Pierce Burton so aptly put it, "was when the devil chuckled".

A letter dated August 26, 1838 by Joseph G. Stolp to his brother Peter D. Stolp at Syracuse, N.Y. is now in the possession of Walter J. Stolp of Oakdale, Calif., a grandson of Peter D. Stolp, who says it was written on two sheets of paper, probably once white but now yellow with age. It was prepared in the old fashioned way of using no envelope, but folded in the shape of an envelope and probably sealed with wax. A copy of the letter as nearly as it can be deciphered and with many omissions, is below:

"Friday 11th - it may possibly be well to tell you what I have been about in this country, or at least this summer. ** I commenced carding in the spring at ten cents a pound, some three or four weeks after this brother Cardes at Charleston put down to eight cents and of course I must too. I have carded this season already between two and three thousand pounds of wool and have got my cash. We Hoosiers have no trust. A Southerner came to me the other day after I had carded his wool. Stranger, says he, I reckon we had better cast up and after we looked over, the old man cast out eleven dollars one picciune and a bit, and away he went. This is the way to do a cash business and then you can do business and please yourself. But I will just go back a few steps. In the spring I told Uncle Joe that I must have some land of him to work this summer. Why you can't, Uncle John engaged it last fall of me, but no Uncle John came. I am to pay Uncle Joe three dollars per acre for six acres. I sowed three to oats, planted $2\frac{1}{2}$ to corn and $\frac{1}{2}$ to potatoes and beans, and my stuff looks well, I assure you. This I intend for father and mother and I am anxious to have them get here as soon as possible to help get it up for I shall not know what to do with it now three steps ahead. It is a busy time with me at present. I am preparing for dressing cloth. There is no fulling mill in this country except mine. I think I shall do a good business this fall. I have just got my laythe in operation ----

letter of Joseph G. Stolp - continued

"Aug. 26, 1838; a word to father and mother. You I suppose, dear parents, are about to start for this country, a long and tedious journey for people of your respective ages. One thing I ask of you and on the trip, think of it. Make yourselves at home wherever you are, put up with farmers over night. I have done this in my course. You find everything you want, if you are fatigued or a little unwell, put up a few days, rest yourselves and your team. Take good care of yourselves, also your team. Spare no pains in making yourselves every way comfortable (to save your money is no object in this case). Bring dried fruit with you if you can, although excellent dried apples here are only fourteen cents per bushel. Margaret says buy a piece of factory --- I want enough for a shirt. I have the money for your eastern paper money is best in this country. They pay you a premium on it. Take no Michigan money on the road west of Detroit."

TRANSCRIBED FROM J. G. STOLP'S JOURNALS: AMENDED AND EXTENDED
BY AID OF MEMORIES OF STORIES TOLD ME WHILE LIVING AT HOME
Caroline Stolp Johnson

"On May 17; 1837, when I was twenty-four years and eight months old, I left father's and mother's home near Marcellus, N.Y., with the purpose of going west to Illinois via the Erie Canal. Having served an apprenticeship in Mr. Parson's woolen mill at Shaneateles I had managed by hardest economies to save about \$100.00. With this I bought a little machinery for wool carding and wool dressing, and with the little chest of clothes which my mother had carefully put in order, not forgetting some packages of food stowed away in the corners, I started off - a strong and eager young fellow, to seek my fortune. I took the boat at Jordan, northwest of Marcellus, on the Erie Canal and travelled seven long days to Buffalo (somewhere about 150 miles). There I embarked on the brig "Illinois" and sailed over the lakes for fourteen days, seasick of course, but happy and hopeful. Arrived at Chicago June 8, 1837. Left that same evening with Charley Hovey (?) for Widow Barres' Point, or Hotel. We got to the little hotel at ten o'clock the same evening; left early in the morning heading for the Des Plaines River; crossed over by skiff; called at a log house hotel. We had a hearty breakfast; took our tin pails with lunch and started out over the lonely prairies toward the "Big Woods" in the vicinity of Aurora. We went thirty miles that day on foot and were well tired out. We stopped in East Dupage, near Lyle (station so called in 1874). Begged old Mr. Pfeffer (?) to let us have his man and wagon to take us to Naperville. He wasn't doing anything in that line, so, sore footed, we jogged on to Naperville; rested a little and then took a bee line for the Big Woods; arrived at my brother John's about sundown Saturday evening, having travelled all the way by "Foot and Walker's" line. The next day we went down to look at my future home - Aurora. In the little village were a few Indians, some four families of Canadian French and the balance Americans. In all there were about fifteen houses, and between seventy-five and one hundred people. There was a small, cheap post office. I erected a little mill located on the present Silver Plate Factory site (now the corner of Island Ave. and Downer Place) and started to card wool that was brought in to me by farmers.

This was soon done. As there was nothing more in sight, I went up to my good relatives, Frederick and John Stolp, who shared with me what small comforts they had. I passed the winter with them, cutting wood and helping in every way I could. In the spring I came back to the island to start work again in my little mill. I was now the sole owner of the island, which was to become the heart of the new town. Four acres of land in the north end of the island had been bought November 18, 1835 of Joseph and Samuel McCarty. It was a squatter's claim and was bought by Uncle Frederick "for J.G. Stolp to erect suitable building for woolen manufacturing for the consideration of money, cloth and fifty days work on the dam at eight shillings a day." South of this McCarty's land (the present Public Library location) an old squatter made claim to about five and one half acres of land. He had suffered from ice and high water the year before and now was willing to part with it for a consideration. He particularly wanted a load of oats, so my uncle Fred and uncle John managed to find eight bushels for him at ten cents a bushel, and off he went, fording the river and leaving the country. This was all managed for me by my uncles a year and half before I landed on the island. Twelve years later I built the brick mill. In the fall and winter of '49 and '50 I started to make cloth. I ran the mill for thirty-eight years, through good times and bad. The time of my greatest prosperity was during the Civil War, and the great inflation of prices made it possible for me to extend my business so that in 1864 I was manufacturing cloth, fancy woolens, hosiery, shawls and flannels. The subsequent decline of business, which eventually ended in failures of many woolen factories, is a story well known in American business. I found it best to sell out the woolen machinery in 1886 and from that time on applied the water power to various small industries that were established in different parts of the old mill building."

In all probability George Stolp, the father, and his wife Catherine, both of them at that time being sixty-three years of age, came to Aurora in the fall of 1838. (Later records show 1841)

John Stolp, the oldest brother of Joseph G. had evidently come to Illinois as early as 1835 or 1836 because his son Levi was born at Big Woods, August 6, 1836. Mrs. U.S. Grant, granddaughter of John Stolp, has in her possession a letter written by him in 1821, copy of which is as follows:

"Dear Father and Mother:

I received a letter from you the 22nd. of March by the politeness of Mr. West. This was a consolation to me and produced many pleasing sensations. I have perused every line and every word and have found it to contain much good advice. Dear parents, I have always been pleased and willing to receive instruction from you. To hear counsel and receive instruction has ever been my motto. You have ever been kind and affectionate to me and you have discharged the duty of parents to your family. This makes me love and respect you. You stated that you wished me to conduct myself in such manner that I might ever be respected and not disgrace my reputation. As to my conduct since I left you, I hope and believe it has been such as may prove a blessing to me and all my relatives.

"I came into this country you know with an intention to take a school, or get into some business which might be of benefit to me, and after making inquiries I found a school and engaged to teach said school for the term of three months at ten dollars per month. And according to agreement I have finished my school and have done my duty to the satisfaction of my employers. In the forpart of winter while teaching school I became acquainted with Esq. Culver and his family which consists of himself, his wife and Lydia Barton, his adopted daughter, the latter of whom I have become peculiarly attached to. After becoming acquainted with her and having had sufficient opportunity to consider and satisfy myself, I have been pleased to unite with her in the bonds of matrimony and turn my attention to things of more importance than the vanity of youth. I now consider myself connected with a respectable family, where we can live in unity and friendship and enjoy the blessings derived from a well spent life. But to be brief and not trouble you with a long series of observations I shall only write that we were united in marriage on Thursday, the 12th of April, by Byram Green, Esq. of Sudus. This was an important period to me. It would have been a great consolation to me to have been pleased with your presence on the occasion.

"When I wrote you in February last, I mentioned nothing concerning our marriage for I knew not the precise time it would take place. Yet I knew it would take place in the spring soon after I had dismissed my school. I expected you knew the same. Therefore I omitted writing until I could terminate what day, and then to write, but in March I received a letter from you wherein you stated that you would come and see me in the fall. I likewise was informed by Uncle Joseph that you thought it not convenient to come sooner. On these conditions I have omitted writing till the present. Now, I admit the above and hope it will meet you approbation and good wishes.

"I have been working in Bloomfield with Mr. Culver, assisting in building a forge with Mr. Stephen Martin and expect to work there till the 1st of June, then return home and build one here on this place.

"Now to close, my health is good and has been since I left Marcellus. I wish you would take the trouble to visit this country as soon as you can but above all, dear father, do not forget to favor me with your letters as soon and as often as possible."

There is also a note written by J.G. Stolp at the time the letter was given to John's daughter, Mrs. Daniel Reagan, as follows: Aurora, March 20, 1895. "This letter was written by my brother seventy-four years ago when I was nine years old, yet I remember when he left our father's home to go west. He had just got through his trade, so he was twenty-one years old and started west some sixty miles on foot with his father's and mother's blessings and a few pennies in his pocket. He gets ten dollars a month for teaching three months school. With \$30.00 he got married. The letter explains all. J. G. S."

The letter is addressed to Mr. George Stolp, Marcellus, Onondago County, N. Y. and bore 12½ cents postage

Peter D Stolp, brother of John and Joseph G, came to Illinois in 1848 by way of the Erie Canal and the Great Lakes, with his family of eight children, four boys and four girls as follows: George Andrews, Stillman Fuller, Jay ~~Constead~~, Myron John, Betsey Adelia, Elpha, Ellen and Artemesia. Joseph G. met them at Chicago with a lumber wagon and took them to a home near North Aurora where they lived until about 1856 and where Catherino (who died in 1855 from a blow on the head by a well sweep) was born in 1849, and also Emily Margaret in 1853.

They later moved to a farm on the Jericho Road west of Aurora, where Sophronia, wife of Peter D., died in 1871, where the daughters Dolia, Elpha, Artie and Emma were married and where the sons, George, Stillman and Jay worked with the father on the farm. Myron John (Johnnie) died in 1853 at North Aurora, and Jay, June 14, 1858.

Our story of Frederick Stolp was written by his great-granddaughter Fannie Hopkins Peffers, as follows:

"Frederick Stolp was born Nov. 8, 1781. My first knowledge of Frederick Stolp is from records at Pultneyville, N.Y., where he and his father-in-law, Abraham Peper Sr., in 1827 had purchased a farm for \$1600.00. One year later Mr. Peper sold his interest to Frederick Stolp for \$600.00. The farm was on Lake Ontario and when my aunt, Mrs. Ell. Stolp Carlisle, visited there in 1900 the old house was partly washed away by the lake.

The Peper family came from Holland in 1802. Abraham Peper was born Nov. 2, 1757 at Oostzouburg, Welcheren Island, Holland. On May 22, 1784 he married Willemena Bloomert, who was born on Welchoren Island, March 16, 1762. Eight children were born at their Oostzouburg home, seven of whom crossed the water. The children were: Abraham, Matias, Jacomina, Janna, Grayna, Jannetje (born Nov. 30, 1790 and married Frederick Stolp in 1813 and died Nov. 11, 1837) Jan and Willemena.

The story is told in the Lawson genealogy (page 297) of his coming to this country. Peper resided in Holland when Napoleon conquered the country and after the occupation two French soldiers went to his home and insulted his family, which caused him to take their lives. So Peper accordingly deemed it best to leave the country. He was a Mason and a member of the Presbyterian Church, bringing his dismissal papers with him to this country. It is said he came to America with \$5000.00 in gold. He also brought with him a span of mouse colored ponies and a carriage. He first settled near Utica in Oneida County, but after a few years moved to Pultneyville, N.Y., about 1807 or 1808. He died on May 9, 1845 and is buried in Lake View Cemetery at Pultneyville, N.Y., as is his wife, who died May 27, 1845.

In 1833, when fifty-two years of age, Frederick came west prospecting for a new home for his large family. He walked all the way to Illinois looking for a location which satisfied him. Passing through what is now Chicago. However, he selected land in Naperville Township near what is now Eola. His own and several neighboring farmhouses were made from brick from his place, also buildings in Aurora. Simeon Leech was his brick maker, The first Stolp house, however was of logs.

After selecting his claim, Frederick walked back to Pultneyville. The habit of walking was one he never gave up and after he was ninety-one years of age he frequently walked to Aurora from his farm. "East of the Big Woods" was his post office address, and my aunt has letters so addressed. However, now not one thing is left to suggest to one's imagination that that woods have ever been in this locality.

In 1834 Frederick left Pultneyville to make his home in Illinois bringing his entire family. This time the trip was made by water. His daughter Catherine was married and she and her husband, David Crane and their child, Frederick Crane, came too. This David Crane died in 1846 and is buried in the Big Woods Cemetery.

Frederick acquired sufficient land so that each of his seven sons had a farm in DuPage County, Henry the youngest living on the homestead. This brick house is still standing, but it is in a dilapidated condition having gone out of the family more than forty years ago.

It was this Frederick Stolp who purchased the Island in the Fox River known as Stolp's Island. Later he sold the Island to his nephew Joseph G Stolp, who built a large woolen mill thereon, the bricks for same having been made at his Uncle Frederick's farm.

Three years after coming to this new country the mother of this large family died, and a few years later Frederick Stolp married Mrs. Amanda Rosier, a widow with one son and two daughters and one of these daughters married Harrison Allboe, a brother of the husband of Frederick's daughter Eliza.

Frederick's son, James B. Stolp, was my grandfather. He was a boy of fourteen when the family moved west, and the following year was sent back to Auburn Academy at Auburn, N.Y.; My aunt has a geometry and book on surveying which he used there. His first wife was Matilda Bently who died in 1845 leaving one child, a daughter Matilda Stolp Sabin, who died in 1909. They both are buried in the Big Woods Cemetery. In 1851, James B. married my grandmother, Mary Christie of Heath, Mass. daughter of William and Sally (Brown) Christie. James's farm was east of his fathers and it was there that my aunt, Mrs. Ella Stolp Carlisle, was born in 1852 and my mother, Mrs. Emma Stolp Hopkins, was born in 1854. The family moved to Aurora when my mother was a year old. James B. Stolp served as an alderman in the first City Council in Aurora. He died in 1875 and his wife Mary in 1892. They are both buried in the West Aurora Cemetery." F. H. P.

Of the hardships and vicissitudes of those early years, and they must have been many, we who remember these early pioneers have heard very little. The Stolps were ever ones to bear their lot, bravely, patiently and philosophically and we trust that these qualities have been passed on to their descendants.

It is because we are proud having descended from such brave and worthy ancestors that this history and genealogy has been written and we trust that all who read it may feel a glow of pride at their heritage. In the long research that has been made, few records are found of great wealth accumulated, but faithfulness, integrity and honest endeavor prove our right as worthy descendants of these Stolps. S. McC.

FOURTH GENERATION - JOHN STOLP (4) son of George (3) son of Johann Peter

John Stolp (4) oldest son of George Stolp (3) and his wife Catherine Stall, was born at Johnstown, N.Y., July 8, 1799. His parents later lived at Marcellus for it was from there he started out when he was twenty-one. As his brother Joseph wrote (Mar. 20, 1895) "I remember when he left our father's house to go west. He had just finished his trade (that of carpenter) so was twenty-one years old and started west some sixty miles on foot, with his father's and mother's blessing and a few pennies in his pocket." He is the first teacher recorded of the very many among the Stolp descendants. The letter he wrote to his parents May 12, 1821, and which is recorded elsewhere, tells of his teaching and marriage. Joseph, the financier, very tersely comments on it, "He gets ten dollars a month for teaching a three months school. With \$30.00 he got married. The letter explains all." J.C.S. Thus is demonstrated the courage and optimism of these early pioneer men and women.

John Stolp and Lydia Barton, adopted daughter of Esquire Culver, of Ontario, N.Y. were married Thursday, April 12, 1821 by Byram (?) Green, Esq. of Sodus, N.Y. She was born Jan. 26, 1803 at Warren, Bristol County, R.I. They lived at Ontario, N.Y., about fourteen years and evidently came to Illinois soon after his uncle Frederick settled at Big Woods (Eola) in 1834. It is probable they came by water as did Frederick Stolp. *<It was by covered wagon>*.
John died Nov 22, 1877. Lydia Apr. 24, 1865.

PETER D STOLP (4) son of George (3) and Catherine Stolp, was born March 2, 1803 at Johnstown, N.Y.. Soon after the family moved to Stratford and later to Marcollus. He was married about 1830 to Sophronia Andrews born Dec. 6, 1806. She was the daughter of Ebenezer Hull Andrews and his wife Betsy Merriman. Betsy was born Sept. 15 1776, the daughter of Chas. Merriman and the granddaughter of Titus Merriman of Wallingford, Conn. She lived to be nearly 101 and celebrated her 100th birthday at the home of her daughter Mrs. Gilbert P. Denison. At this time she recited a poem she had learned when she was eight years old. (This is inserted for the benefit of those who are Andrews as well as Stolps.) Peter Stolp came to Illinois in 1848 with his wife Sophronia and his family of eight children. They came by way of the Erie Canal and the Great Lakes. Joseph Stolp, his youngest brother who had preceded him by ten years met them at Chicago with a lumber wagon and took them to a home near North Aurora. Here they lived until about 1856. Two children were born here, Catherine and Emily Margaret. Myron John died here in 1853 and Cathorine in 1855, her death being caused by a blow on the head from a well sweep. Later they moved to a farm on the Jericho Road about three miles southwest of Aurora, Here Peter's wife Sophronia died July 3, 1871, aged 64 years. Not many of her grandchildren know her, but others who did have often told of her sweetness and kindness. Her helpfulness as a neighbor was long remembered as well as her fine christian character. Peter Stolp, as I remember him was a man of high principles and integrity a hard worker, with little leisure for amusement. Total deafness hampered much his enjoyment of life. He died in Aurora Aug. 23, 1884 at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Adelia Brusson

SARAH STOLP (4) daughter of George Stolp (3) was born Aug. 15, 1820 at Marcellus, N.Y. and died in Leadville, Colo., May 6, 1885. She was married to Salmon Andrews who was born Aug. 14, 1808, died Aug. 2, 1877. He was the son of Ebenezer Hull Andrews and Betsy Merriman Andrews. A brother of hers Peter D. Stolp married Sophronia Andrews, sister of Salmon Andrews. Betsy Merriman was born at Wallingford, Conn., Sept. 15, 1776, being the oldest child of Charles Merriman and Rachel Cowles. This Charles Merriman served as a private in the Revolution as did his father Titus Merriman, who was also a Minute Man. (Eligibility to the D.A.R. may be proved from this fact. See: Certificate from State Library, Wallingford Town Records - Historical Society Papers - Merriman Genealogy P. 168 also National Number 130798) Betsy Merriman was married (1) to Solomon Squires and (2) to Ebenezer Hull Andrews. She celebrated her 100th birthday Sept. 5, 1876 at the home of her daughter Betsy, Mrs. Gilbert P. Denison, near Aurora, Ill. At this time she recited a poem which she had learned when eight years of age. (This is inserted for the benefit of those who are Andrews as well as Stolps.) We have been told that Salmon Andrews and his wife Sarah, also Betsy Andrews Denison and her husband Gilbert, were members of a concert troupe which were left stranded by their manager, near Hebron, Indiana. This, no doubt was the reason why Salmon and Sarah Andrews settled at Hebron. Caroline Stolp Johnson says of Salmon Andrews, "He was slight in appearance - a dignified and scholarly gentleman." The children of Sarah and Salmon Andrews as follows:

(Stolp is spelled various ways in the early records.

His family later moved to Marcellus, N.Y. As related elsewhere he brought his family to Illinois in 1834, making his home at Big Woods now Eola. His occupation was that of brickmaker and as is stated the clay at that place was suitable for making bricks. His first house was of logs but later one was built of bricks of his own making. Joseph G. Stolp purchased bricks of his uncle Frederick for the building of his woolen mill. An interesting fact in connection with this genealogy has recently been discovered. The last work done on the pages is the punching of holes for the covers, which was done in this same old woolen mill on the bank of the Fox River at Aurora, now occupied by B. C. Jess Company.

Frederick's home at Eola was the meeting place for the young people of the neighborhood. It was also the custom to hold family reunions there on his birthday. At the last one held in 1871 one hundred thirty were present. Frederick's wife Jannette, born Nov. 30, 1790 died Nov. 11, 1837. A few years later he married Mrs. Amanda Rosier, a widow with one son and two daughters.. Frederick died in 1873 at the age of ninety-two. He is buried in Spring Lake Cemetery, Aurora.

BITS HERE AND THERE

Joseph Stolp (1) known to most of the relatives as Great Uncle Joseph, was a very hospitable man. One year he made a feast for the few Indian families at his home north of Aurora. This they enjoyed greatly, so much so that when it was over the squaws first called in the dogs, then gathered up all that remained of the feast and carried it away in their aprons. This was to show their appreciation.

Frederick Stolp was very proud of his beautiful garden, similar to that at Mt. Vernon. He kept a hox by the entrance gate so that no stray weed might escape. He was also said to be a very handsome man stately, and in later years, with a crowning glory of white hair.

Peter D. Stolp, father of several grown daughters, was very deaf. A suitor for one of these daughters thought to find a quiet spot in the field where he might ask for her hand. It was very interesting to the hired hand who happened to be near.

Like all small boys of every age, Joseph G. Stolp was not particularly fond of trudging the two miles to the school house. Passing the field where his brother Peter, more than ten years his senior, was working, he called out, "Oh, Pieter, Pieter, tell mammy I'm sick." But Pieter quietly picked up a switch and little Joseph's logs carried him to school much faster than he had intended.

The following story of Hannah Dustin is familiar in many histories. This Hannah Dustin was the ancestor of Temperance Stolp, wife of Joseph G. Stolp of Plattsburg, N.Y. She kept a tailor shop on N. Broadway, and the acquaintance formed culminated in their marriage in 1839.

"Mrs. Hannah Dustin of Haverhill, Mass., was lying in bed with her weak old babe. Her husband and seven children were in the fields. Mr. Dustin saw the Indians coming and told the children to run to the fort. He started for his home to save his wife and babe. As he approached he saw the home in flames. Believing his wife was dead and that he could be of no assistance to her, he went to the fort to be with his children.

"In the meantime the Indians had dashed the head of the crying babe against the wall; they then took Mrs. Dustin and the nurse and started for Canada..winter came on.

"One night while twelve Indians were sleeping, Mrs. Dustin, the nurse and a boy captive, arose and with axes killed all of the Indians, with the exception of two, a squaw and a young boy.

"Mrs. Dustin, the nurse and boy, started back to Haverhill, where they arrived after about two months. They presented the ten Indian scalps to the authorities, for which they received a fifty pound (50 £) bounty.

"Mrs. Dustin is buried at Haverhill and there is a monument erected in her memory. Every year there is a Dustin Day in Haverhill."

IN MEMORIAM

Several of our number have left us during the past year. Dr. Rufus Byron Stolp passed away suddenly at his hom in Kenilworth Nov. 3, 1942. It was through the data he furnished us that we were able to secure the entire record of Orlando C. Stolp. It was with regret that we remembered the words of the poem he sent for our reunion and that was read at that time, Oct. 25, 1942.

"I hope that I may live to see
The finished genealogy."

We also note with regret the passing of Fannie Hopkins Peffers on Saturday, Sept. 4, 1943. Her interest and assistance in preparing the genealogy were extensive and greatly appreciated. She had a photostatic copy of the original grant of the island signed by President John Tyler, to Frederick Stolp, who in turn passed it on to Joseph G. Stolp, for whom it was bought. She also had a copy of the deed made which is in our possession.

Her interest in civic affairs and all things pertaining to the history of Aurora were a great part of her life. She will be greatly missed in many circles. She was regent of the Aurora D.A.R. for ten years, also State Regent of Illinois.

The passing of William Byron Dameron, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis T. Dameron (descendant of Orlando Stolp (5) of Macon, Mo. is noted with especial regret. He was a young man of thirty- one well liked and highly respected and his going was very sudden.

As we close our records we note the passing of Mrs. Eva Stolp Winder of Sheridan, Ill., on Sept. 17, 1943.

THE STOLPS AS SOLDIERS

Beginning with the story of Johann Peter Stolp who came to America at the age of twelve and who perhaps less than fifteen years later took up arms in the service of his adopted country, we find through the years ample records of patriotism and bravery.

Johann Peter was a private in Capt. Johannes Hogeboom's Company of Militia. The documents were signed by Johannes Hogeboom, Capt. at Claverack, N.Y., May 13, 1767. By this document it appears that he was in the French and Indian War. He also was a private in the Albany County Militia, 8th Regiment N.Y., under Colonel Robert Van Rensselaer during the Revolution. Gerlough, probably his brother, was in the same regiment (reference: N.Y. in the Revolution as Colony and State, by James Roberts, Comptroller, 2nd edition 1898 Albany N.Y., page 115.)

Johann Jost (2) born March 1, 1794, youngest son of Johann Peter and known here in Aurora as Great Uncle Joseph, was in the War of 1812. He is buried in West Aurora Cemetery. Frederick Stolp also served in the War of 1812.

In the Civil War, the first record we have of enlistment is that of Rufus S. Stolp, son of John Stolp, on Oct. 25, 1861 at Naperville, Ill. After serving until December 1863 he was honorably discharged but immediately re-enlisted as a veteran and served until June 14, 1865, when he was mustered out as 1st. sergeant. He served in 2nd. Regiment Light Artillery, Battery 1. To this same regiment belonged Stillman Fuller Stolp, son of Peter D. Stolp and cousin of Rufus S. Stolp. Stillman Stolp enlisted Dec. 31, 1861, was mustered out in December 1863 and again re-enlisted as a veteran Jan. 1, 1864, serving until June 14, 1865 when he was mustered out as a Corporal.

George A. Stolp, oldest son of Peter D. Stolp was the only one left to help his aged father on the farm and did so, bearing bravely his disappointment at not finding it possible to enlist. However, on Jan. 1 1864, when Rufus and Stillman enlisted as veterans, he enlisted as a private and served until the close of the war, being mustered out June 14, 1865. He also served in Battery 1, 2nd Regiment Light Artillery.

Battery 1 was recruited in Will County. Recruits were mustered in at Camp Butler, Dec. 31, 1861, were ordered to Cairo, Illinois and took part in the siege of Island no. 10 in Sheridans Division. After re-enlistment in Jan. 1864 the company remained in camp at Joliet until Mar. 4, 1864 when they were sent to Chattanooga, Tenn. On May 6, 1864 they were with Sherman in his campaign and marched with him on his memorable march to the sea. (These records are from History of Kane County page #398 and from records of the Adjutant General of the U.S.A., page 280-511-512-702-704-705)

George Miller, son of Catherine Stolp and Allen Miller, enlisted in the 105th Ill. Inf. Co. F. Aug 8, 1862 and was mustered out as Corporal June 7, 1865

Albert Miller, his brother, enlisted Aug. 9, 1862 in same company and was mustered out June 7th 1865.

Lucius Stolp, son of Abraham, enrolled Aug. 8, 1862 in Capt. Kidder's Co. E. 89th Ill. Inf. Died Aug. 4, 1864 in Andersonville Prison, Ga.

Philander Stolp, son of Johann Jost 2 (Joseph) of Aurora, also served in the Civil War. Stillman Fuller Andrews served with Col. Frank Palmer. He spent several months in Andersonville. Chester Williams, husband of Margaret Andrews, served with the 5th Indiana Cavalry.

Those who Married Stolps

No less noteworthy are the records of those who married daughters of Peter D., James and Joseph G. Stolp. Samuel B. Sherer, who married Elnora Stolp, daughter of Joseph G. Stolp, was Captain of the 36th Ill. Vol. Cavalry which was recruited near Aurora at Montgomery. To this company also belonged Joseph F. McCroskey, who enlisted Aug. 2, 1861 was mustered out in Sept. 23, 1861, re-enlisted as a veteran Jan. 1, 1864 and was mustered out Nov. 22, 1865, having been sent to Texas with his company after the close of the war in April, 1865 because of disorder there and because of fear of trouble with Mexico. March 26, 1864 while home on furlough, he was married at Aurora, Ill. to Elpha. G. Stolp, daughter of Peter D. Stolp.

When Fort Sumpter was fired upon Friday April 12, 1861, Joseph McCroskey was attending school at Jennings Seminary. On Saturday the young women of the school made a flag, as none could be bought at that time. The young men erected a flag pole, both of which were finished by late afternoon. The teachers of the school, among them was Prof. Quereau long known to citizens of Aurora, and the young students gathered on top of the building to see the flag raising. In speaking of it later Mr. McCroskey said that as it was raised to the top it fluttered in the breeze for a moment and then floated proudly to full size, which to all present seemed like a most favorable omen. Mr. McCroskey taught school winters for forty years, working at carpenter work in the summers.

Thomas Bexon, who married Temperance Stolp, daughter of John Stolp, was also a veteran of the Civil War. He was born in Southwell, Nottinghamshire, England, coming with his parents to this country when he was eight years old. On the outbreak of the war he enlisted in the 13th Illinois Infantry and served three years. After spending a year at home (employed in the locomotive machine shop) he re-enlisted and served to the end of the war. He was killed while supervising the installation of Aurora's first fire alarm system. At his funeral the city flag was displayed at half mast over the Court House. Every company of the Fire Dept. including the car shop company, turned out with full ranks, wearing their uniforms, caps, belts and badges. He was also a member of Son's of Albion Lodge and Aurora Post of G....R. (copied from Aurora paper of date of death.)

THE SPANISH AMERICAN WAR

Rufus Lincoln, son of Louisa Stolp and William Lincoln, served in the Spanish American War. He died in the soldiers home at Danville, Ill.
