A SPRING LOWCOUNTRY TOUR By Jason H. Stevens, M.D.

We are fortunate in our area to not only having the many resources of the Heritage Library to keep us in touch with our chosen homes but to also have access to several tours which illuminate and display the unique beauties of our region.

Each spring and fall there are tours and excursions, which delve into the past of our area. On March 22 the annual Episcopal Church Women of St. Helena's Parish Church low country tour set off from Beaufort for a visit to several historical sites.

First stop on the self-driving tour was Huspa Plantation which is on Paiges's Point in Beaufort County. This was a 35,000 acre King's grant to the Fuller Family in 1662. It remained in the family until the Civil War and a descendent of the Fuller family regained ownership in 1976. The original house burned

many years ago, but left magnificent chimneys and old foundations still remaining. The entrance is through a magnificent oak alley and the present house dates from 1979. Paneling comes from splitting beams from the Union Station in Atlanta and since the present owner is an aviation enthusiast many of the artworks and mementoes are aviation-oriented. There is a two-direction airfield close to the house and classic barnstorming open-cockpit airplanes were taking off and landing for the entertainment of the tour.

Another stop on the tour was a visit to St. James The Greater Church, which was established in the tiny town of Catholic Hill in 1826 to serve the plantation owners and their slaves. The church burned in 1856 and was not rebuilt for 40 years when a priest Daniel Berberich accidentally found the presence of Catholic peo-



ple in this tiny rural area. The former slaves had kept their religion alive and a new church was built in 1897. The small red-painted sanctuary is furnished with antiques of the period. Many families in the congregation of 35 are descendents of the original membership and present priests travel from Charleston to serve the worshipers each Sunday.

We also visited Clarenden Plantation, which dates back to the late 1700's. The property is an amalgam of several pre-Civil War plantations and is presently used primarily as a hunting club. James M. Cox who was the Democratic nominee for president in 1922 once owned it. Cox and his vice president nominee Franklin D. Roosevelt were defeated by Warren Harding. The beautiful white columned large brick 2-storied home sits on beautiful lawns above the Whale Branch River and is filled with classic antiques. The present owners are still acquiring land, and as its use is as a hunting plantation, it is reminiscent of a way of life that existed in the low country including Hilton Head Island for over 50 years. Paul Hamilton (1762-1816) governor of South Carolina and Secretary of the Navy under President Madison is buried on the plantation. A wonderful lunch with classic Lowcountry fried chicken was served on the lawns to the guests, accompa-

nied by a blue grass band and enactors in Civil War costumes.

The last stop was to White House Plantation in Colleton County just over the Combahee River. This originally was a rice plantation acquired by Edmund Bellinger in 1702. It remained in the family for the next 2 centuries until as so often happened in the aftermath of the Civil War the property was sold by the Colleton Sheriff because of a debt of \$171.08 owed by Joseph Bellinger. The present Charleston owners use the present property as a duck-hunting retreat and the present house is approx. 20 years old built on the site where the former house burned to the ground. There are several buildings on the plantation including a guest quarters that survived the fire and was moved into a beautiful garden when the present house was built. The furniture, which has many unusual pieces with a hunting motif, is scattered throughout the main house and 2 guest cottages. As the tour guests strolled amongst the magnificent live oaks and huge lawns overlooking Ivanhoe Creek and a large bass and duck pond, they were taken back in time by the wonderful harmonies of the Huspa Baptist Church Choir. The centuries dropped away and it was easy to imagine how Hilton Head Island must have seemed in those days.

The Heritage Library has a large collection of books encompassing these times and areas and tours such as described go a long way towards enriching our lives.

Many thanks to those of you who have contributed volumes to our Library. It is through your generosity that our library continues to grow. Most recently Noel H. Goeke contributed to the Civil War collection a set of the "Collector's Library of the Civil War." This is a full 24 volume set of memoirs, memories, reminiscences, diaries, and personal recollections of the participants, blue and gray, originally published in the decades following the events recorded and republished in the series by Time Life Books in the 1980's. This addition to our library presents a fascinating look through the mists of time into the real lives of real people. It's a "must read" for all true fans of that period of the American experience.

Dr. Antonio Reyes-Guerra, a local author, has expanded our information on the Twentieth Century with the contribution of Time Life Books series on the Second World War and The History of Aviation. These series are richly illustrated with photographs and maps and will provide a wealth of data to anyone researching the events of the last century.

Alan Chaput, is a historian and author and recent addition to the Hilton Head Island writing scene having relocated from northern Ohio found a home for his 218 volume collection of genealogical and historical books. With Alan's help our Michigan, Pennsylvania, and Virginia collections have really grown. More significantly Alan's gift has grown our Canadian data from one book to a total of 44. One of the Canadian collection's special additions is the 7 volume set of the 26 original founding families of Canada — Dictionnaire Genealogique des Familles Canadiennes.

We thank each of these men for their contribution. Letters from Hannah

Recently donated by Rose U. Shivar, this lovely compilation of the letters tells a wonderfully frank and poignant story of the life, love and turbulent times experienced by Hannah Elizabeth PHILLIPS the daughter of Julia Sara Jones and the Rev. David Arthur Phillips and her fiancé (over the strenuous objections of her parents), Charles Ephraim ULMER, Jr., son of Charles Ephraim Ulmer, Sr. and Elizabeth Drayson Baynard.

From the Prologue... "The correspondence she had with this young man over the next five years and after her marriage, while she was away from Bluffton and Charles, shows the growth of their love and the difficulties they incurred during this period of courtship and marriage. Her letters, which were kept by Charles, include clippings, drawings and poems, as well as descriptions of Hannah and her family's daily life." The transcriptions cover the time period from 1914 after Hannah's graduation from Columbia College when she moved to Bluffton for her first teaching position and there met the man she would later marry. The correspondence continues over the next five years and after her marriage. They include letters to Charles while they were separated by World War I. It is part love story and part history and mentions people and places in and near the Bluffton area. The back pages contain Hannah's family tree and the following names appear: Bolin, Cooper, Corbi(e)tt, During, Evans, Fanning, Fanning, Felder, Ha(e)rtzog, Hawkins, Hill, Jones, McColphen, Phillips, Salley, Shaumloffel, Snell, Stone, Suber, Utsey, Utsey, Von Arx, Williamson, and Youn/Yonn.
