# Heritage Library Begins Tenth Year

Nine years ago last month, Betsey Wolf, Randy Holcombe, and I signed the Articles of Incorporation and sent them off to the Office of the Secretary of State of South Carolina. The Certificate of Incorporation came back dated July 23, 1997.

That day, Hilton Head Island and the Lowcountry had a brand new research center and library dedicated to the study of history and family heritage. It started with three

crofilm reader/printer as part of ongoing Civil War microfilm records project.

The rather large piece of equipment together with its desktop unit and screen occupying one corner in the Holcombe Computing Center is here temporarily while Library researchers and patrons evaluate its capabilities and potential benefits.

Traditional microfilm reader/ printers produce only reproductions on paper of the microfilmed images with results of varying quality and readability.

The advent of computers bringing to researchers the wonders of digital imaging have produced advances to family heritage searching

# Sprechen Sie deutsch? Parlez-vous Francais? Talar ni suedois?


The above phrases were taken from an old Encyclopedia Britannica and may not be in the modern language so, as you can see, we do need help.

members in a nine by twelve office without windows on the third floor of the Courtyard Building. Nine years later, with your encouragement and magnificent support, The Heritage Library Foundation is housed in over 2800 square feet, still on the third floor of the Courtyard Building, but with lots of windows.

The activities of The Heritage Library with its collections and computers occupy most of the time, talent, and available resources of some 40 volunteers as it strives to serve the needs of its members and visitors. Over 2200 patrons researched at the Library in 2005, more than a quarter of whom were visitors to our island and express great joy upon finding such a resource so readily at hand.

Heritage Library Press has published six books with four in various stages of production. It is responsible for the quarterly newsletter and our website, Heritage Library Foundation On-Line, our portal to a worldwide audience.

Each year, Heritage Library Workshops reaches out to the

local community through educational programs, lectures, classes, and seminars from September to May. Its presentations are designed to provide a wide ranging cross section of history and genealogical information to audiences from school age to senior citizen.

With the inclusion of the Hilton Head Island Historical Society last year, the responsibility for the preservation of Fort Mitchel and Zion Chapel of Ease Cemetery properties (more than 8,000 persons visited Fort Mitchel alone in the last 12 months) added a significant new dimension to the role of your foundation.

None of this would have been possible without you, the membership. By your encouragement with suggestions and ideas; your support by attendance at programs and use of the Library; your time volunteered at the Library as well as the Foundation's boards and committees; and by your generous contributions each year to the financial wellbeing of the organization, you have made the first nine years of The Heritage Library, great ones filled with achievement.

nothing short of dramatic according to John Griffin, Director of Research for The Heritage Library. Mr. Griffin is currently leading the team of evaluators working on the project.

Cassie Sanders, a recent addition to the Library's volunteer team, in her first major project for the Library is copying and indexing the U.S. Civil War Tax Sale Certificates sold to members of the Army, Navy, and Marines from January 1864 thru March 1865. Peter Axene, also newly joined volunteer is doing the same work with the Civil War Tax Sale Certificates sold to Heads of Families of the African Race dating from December 1863 thru June 1872.

Since many of these documents record land transfers to members of units stationed on Hilton Head with The Department of the South, they are expected to prove invaluable to researchers among the native island Gullah population.
