Melissa was born January 5, 1832 in New Hampshire to Eleazer Davis Chamberlin (1793-1832) and Hannah Hayes (1797-1872). She was appointed early 1865 by the Freedmen's Aid Society as a teacher to the freedmen in South Carolina and was sponsored by the Lovejoy chapter of the FAS.¹ She arrived on Hilton Head Island in 1865 and taught for a very short time there before being reassigned to Charleston at the end of April 1865 where she was the Principal of Ashley Street School aka the 'Old Rebel Post Office'.² By the 1870 Census, Melissa was back in Dover, NH living with her parents. The 1900 and 1910 US Census show her living with two different families in Boston, Massachusetts. Melissa died in Boston from paralysis of the uterus and is buried with her parents in Pine Hill Cemetery in Dover, New Hampshire.³
