Ever Kind and Loving Wife.

It is with due respect to you for your many acts of kindness towards me that I attempt to address you with those few lines in assurance to you that I am well & in the enjoyments of verry good Health in boddy but my mind in regard to home affairs is at times very sick. However Dear Jane I hope that those few lines may find you and the children in good Health am peace of mind and also pleanty, I have nothing new Jane to tell you as I hve exceedingly well lately in writing to you therefore I have written you all the news, but I have been deeply a mediatating upon your affairs & Sit<sup>c</sup>umstances & noticeing in a most all of your address to me that you write them on Sunday & as today is Sunday I imagined that you was at this preasant moment busily engaged in penning off to me your kind remarks & regards, and while thinking this over I concluded to do the Same by you. So at the same time while you are writing the History of the affairs at Home to me I am<sup>a</sup> writing the History of the affairs of camp life to you but I have but very little to say about it as the health of the Boys is pretty good. there is only two of our Boys in the Hospital Here Jacob Myers has been in the Hospital Since we left Jackson and has been pretty sick but is a little on the gain now. the march and the turrible Hot weather that had was too much for him Some will March untill they drop down which is verry rong. when I feel the worse for heat I will Stop let it cost what it will. Jake fainted away & fell over while standing up to Rolecall at Jackson The other man that is in the Hospital is from Elmore. Thornton has been under the weather a while past but I have him on corporal of the guard today Cramer is as Harty as I ever saw him & also Hegerty & that is about all the Ridge Boys that is left in the Camp. Hegerty received a letter from John Furgerson yesterday, He is at Mound City Illinois he wrote a very discouraging letter that his complaints was hard to cure that was the Despepey He wanted his Discriptive Roll sent to him so that he could draw his pay. I hardly know what to write you Jane as Alexas Gorrill is probably at home now and he can tell all that has been

going on. I have a nice present of some money for you which I have concluded to send it in this letter I don't like to send it in a letter but I can't get a chance to express it without I can get to Vicksburg & I dreadfully late (hate?) to carry it around in my pocket for it is apt to get stolen or lost one man in Camp I. (?) lost 30 dollars this morning & I think the money is about as safe to go in a letter as it is in my pocket here. & I am in a hurry to send you a present for I know you are anxious to get one from me & I will make you a present of 40 Dollars which I will inclose in this letter I may as well send it all in one letter as to take two or three. You have been talking this long while about sending me a present but I have not seen it yet It would please me very much to even get a piece of your old derf's anything that is yours but don't send me any more of old Wif's Sammy Woods Potographs for I have no taste for them. Your own photograph will be very much acceptable or any thing that is yours or the children those little presents are very pleasing here in the Army. I was very sorry that I had nothing to send you when Gorrill or Capt. Dennis want home but I had nothing & I could get nothing it would please me as well as it would you to send you something nice. Cap Dennis went off very unexpected after getting his papers He left immediately I should be very much pleased Jane to be at Home with you & help you eat the garden since I never was so hungry for garden since in my life. I expect if I was at Home to set down to the table with you my appetite would all leave me. but I know if I could not eat I could talk <sup>with</sup> you and tell you some grate long stories which would be very interesting & I could help you get Dinner. How I would like to have one of your pies to eat,

You may be a little School Mam but I know you will make a good one. I have been verry anxious all along to get a letter from you. I expected to get one from you before this time but it has not come yet, you must tell Emma and Gregory and the two little ones that they must all try & be good children & mind and help mother for She has a goodeal to see yo to untill I come Home, which I hope will not be long perhaps by next Spring. I hope so at least. I have writen you all at preasant.

This is one of two letters written by Sherman A. Jackson while he was in the Civil War. He died in Andersonville Prison, Jan. 12, 1865. He is buried in the National Cemetery, Americus, Ga. The original copies of these letters are in the family Lula (Emery) Bowmann. Her mother was Emma Emery Jackson, Daughter of S.A. Jackson The two little children mentioned in his letter were twins, Melinda and Philanda, The Desent of my family is as follows: Sherman A. and Jane (Furry) Jackson; Melinda(Jackson) Hampton; Maude (Hampton) Roller; Joan(Roller) Enright. Kind and Affectionate Wife,

It is with the greatest of pleasure that I set down this evening to address you with a few lines and to inform you that I am well & enjoying good Health & really hope this may find you & the Children enjoying the Same Blessing. I have been very anxious to hear from you and looked very much for a letter today but was disappointed. Since I last wrote you we have had march over a good portion of the State of Mississippi or at least over one Hundred miles we started in the morning of the 14<sup>th</sup> & arrived here in camp on the evening of the 21<sup>st</sup> We were all tired enough to drop down on the ground & rest fare the night my Health has been very good while on the march & also all the Boys of Camp E Stood the march well the Boys are all in good Health 16 in number we had no commissioned officer with us & therefore I had to take command of the camp. Our Brigade did not meet with any difficulty but we could hear cannonading & firing a going on with our advanced troops the Rebs were about thirty thousand Strong they would not stand any Battle with us but they would watch their opportunity & make a dash on some of our weakest points the 72<sup>nd</sup> lost two men one killed & the other is not heard from, this happened by their Stragling from the Regt. we were drawn up in line of Battle on the 3<sup>rd</sup> day by a Volley of some five or six guns but that was the last that we heard of them for that day & we did not have a chance to fire off our guns. I received a letter from you dated Sept. 27 on the morning that we started on the march it gave me great pleasure to hear that you were all well you wrote in it that you did at one time Stop family worship I new that there was something wrong by your two letters that I got before the last they were both full of trouble & they troubled me very much but I have not left off my family worship and I am still a praying for you & the children. I have a great deal to tell you Dear Jane about this. You know Jane that you worked hard for me to brake off my evil ways & join the church & which by so doing we have taken comfort & enjoyed Sweete

Happinefs & prosperity and it will be so with us al (a) long as we try to live a good Christain (life) this I know to be so and I know Dear Jane that if we give up surving the good Lord now that wo (woe) & distruction is our portion I can see it & I know it to be so you know how it has been Dear Jane and it will be tenn times worse if we fall from grace I leave off family worship. O Dear Jane you Should Prey without Seacing to the good Lord that your Husband might continue to Prey & to Lead a Christain life that you and your Dear Children might live in the enjoyment of peace & happinefs & pleanty and enjoy all Earthly Happinefs for such is the Christain lot the good Lord tells us that we must be persecuted and we must prey for those that persecute us & if you are persecuted Dear Jane do not leave off your preying but prey the more sincerely for those that persecute you. and the Lord will Elefs you & releive you from your tryals the more you Pray the happyer you will feel. this is the way it is with me & I know it is so with every preying person. You wrote in one of you letters that if I thought more of your persecuter than I did of you I should say so or Something like that this hurt my feelings verry much for you know Dear Jane that thare never was a man that loved his Wife & Children more than I do and thare is not a being on Earth that I love so well as you and all my letters and actions & words goes to prove it & I never could stand it to hear anyone say one word against you & I am bound to protect you & care for you and do all I can for you at all times Hoping that you will always do to others as you would that they would do to you. it looks so verry bad Jane to quarrell with neighbors try to live in peace with all when I come Home I want to meete all in good friendship How much pleasanter it would be to do so and I know Jane that if we all live to see this war over we will take more sollid comfort together than we ever did before if we keep up family worship and if we Stop that I dont know what will become of us. Preying Jane is all that is a going to make us Happy & prosper in this world the trials and hardships that we are receiving now is for our good when the dark season is over we will know how to appreciate good things & pleasant times. but we must be patient & content always giving thanks to the good Lord

for you never have told me how you(r) potatoes turned out & wheather you got the well dug or not. nor hardly anything about home. I want that back field seeded down next spring at all events. I suppose thare was nothing on it this summer only a few potatoes if it had been sewed to grafs seed it would have fetched you fifty Dollars this way its worth nothing,

Oct ~~14th~~<sup>15th</sup> we are all well this morning the weather is quite cold & wet the most of the Camp is on picket this morning I sent you my Commiaion for first Sargeant you thot that I was a working for something that I would not get but you see that I did get it. I should like to hear wheather Will is a coming back to the Regt or not I have not heard from John lately I expect he is at Memphis. Jake Baker is a going Home next on furlough. I believe I have told you all the news it so cold I cant write I want you to set down & make up your mind to write me a good long letter when you get this. You never said a word what Mr Myers said about us nor anything of the kind things that I want to hear about. you leave out. I hope that I wont hear any more quarling I dont want to hear about that.

give my love to Father and Mother & to all

please send me a pair of socks I had bad luck with them last ones you sent me a nasty little mouse eat the foot of one up while on this last march  
Send them by Baker.

You wanted to know wheather I ever paid any postage on your letters I never paid a cent on a letter in the Army our Regt Postmaster has no rite to take any money a letter that is not paid will be Stopt before it gets in the Regt. & it is nothing but a Shame that you have to pay postage on my letter, when I have paid it unless they mean to charge a soldier more than they do a citizen. <sup>seems</sup> it that they do.

My love & well wishes to Almeria & Emma & Gregory & milinda & Philinde & a good Share to your Self.

Replying to your letter received December 16, 1970. You requested the service record etc. of the above captioned person. We do not have an Andrew Sherman Jackson listed in the Index to the Official Roster of the Civil War, or in any Company of the 72nd. Regiment, O.V.I. There are thirty one veterans listed in the Index to the Official Roster of the Civil War who have the name of "Andrew Jackson", by checking each name in each Company of the 72nd. Regiment, O.V.I, this name was eliminated. There isn't an Andrew Jackson listed in any Company of this Regiment either.

On the possibility that the veteran served under the name of Sherman, we checked that name. There is a Sherman A. Jackson listed in the Index to the Official Roster of the Civil War, he was in Company E, of the 72nd. Regiment, O.V.I. We are enclosing a Certified Copy of his record with this letter, taken from the Official Roster of the Civil War. His age does not correspond at all with the birth date you submitted, February 3, 1827, but some of the other data matches. You may just destroy the Certificate if you feel it is not the correct record.

We hope to have been of service to you.

This Regiment was organized in the State of Ohio, at large, from October, 1861, to February, 1862, to serve three years. The original members (except veterans) were mustered out December 14, 1864, by reason of expiration of term of service, and the organization, composed of veterans and recruits, remained in service until September 17, 1865, when it was mustered out in accordance with orders from the War Department.

The official list of battles, in which this Regiment bore an honorable part, is not yet published by the War Department, but the following list has been compiled, after careful research, during the preparation of this work:
