ISAAC QUINTARD.

The following is from "Norwalk", by the Rev C.M. Selleck (1896): from "Inscriptions from Graveyards of Norwalk", by Francis F. Spies, Mount Vernon, N.Y. (1930): and from a Quintard Genealogy by Edwin A. Cooper, unpublished, in the possession of Mrs Burgis D. Jennings of Norwalk: and from other genealogies mentioned in the text which follows.

Isaac Quintard was the son of Isaac and Marie Quintard of Lusignan, province of Poitou, France, where Isaac was born prior to 1670. He was described as an "Ouvrier en laine, demeurant oydevant, proche a Lusignan, en Poitou". His father and mother emigrated from Brittany to Bristol, England, about 1690, soon after the revocation of the Edict of Nantes in 1685. Isaac was probably at this time a minor, his marriage not having occurred until about eight years later. Several other Quintards emigrated at the same time to England.

The following quotation is from "The Huguenot Emigration to America", Vol 2, pp 158-60:- "A standing invitation had gone forth to the persecuted Huguenots from the Protestant powers of Europe, to take refuge among their fellow religionists in foreign parts. Multitudes had already accepted this invitation and were now enjoying a generous hospitality in England, Holland, Germany and Switzerland. Three hundred thousand persons made their escape from France; the largest numbers fled to Holland but England was the city of refuge for many of those who ultimately reached America". Ibid, Vol 2, p 148:- "Bristol at that time, second only to London in commercial importance, was a more permanent home. . . Of all the refugee colonies in Great Britain, this one possessed the greatest interest for Americans. The register of the Huguenot Congregation of Bristol, from its formation in 1687 to the close of the century, abounds in names that have become naturalized with us. Here are the Badeaus, the Bonnets, the Morins, the Quintards, and others whose flight from France we have traced and whose happiness it was now up to be gathered in a harmonious brotherhood in the hospitable city of Bristol. This little colony of refugees composed a selected and favored group; they enjoyed the patronage of the Bishop of Bristol, Sir Jonathan Trelawney. It was this good Bishop's influence, doubtless, that procured for the refugees the privilege of using as their house of worship, the beautiful church known as St Marks, founded in the 13th century. This building had been granted by the Crown in 1540 to the Mayor and Burgesses of Bristol for public uses, and it was with their consent that the French Protestants worshipped there from the year 1687 to 1721. The first ministers were Alexander Descairac and Jeremie Tinel".

In the Bristol French Church Register, now preserved in Somerset House, London, it is recorded that on November 26/1693, Isaac Quintard, from Lusignan, Poitou, France, was married in the Chapel of the Gaunt, to Jeanne Fume, daughter of David (named sometimes Daniel) and Esther (Herault) Fume, from Mescheres in Zaintonge, her family being formerly of Poitou. The Fume family joined this church in Bristol in 1686, and came to New York in 1698.

In 1697, Isaac Quintard came from Bristol to New York City, and joined the French church on Wall St. On October 1/1708, Isaac, then a merchant in New York, bought land at Stamford from Robert Embree; the land was bounded by the home lots of Bates, north: by the home lots of Samuel Hait and Samuel Scofield, deceased, east: by the common, west and south. Isaac died in Stamford in the fall of 1714.

The following is a copy of his last will and testament, with an inventory of his estate amounting to \$1742 11/4 being exhibited.

ISAAC QUINTARD.

Court of Probate held in Fairfield on January 15/1714.

Imprimis: I do hereby give and bequeath and devise unto my dear and loving wife Jeanne, one third part of all my Goods, Chattels and Monies, which I shall have in my hands at the time of my decease, and £200 out of the debts which I shall then have owing me, to be at her disposal forever.

Then I do hereby give grant and devise unto my sd wife Jeanne, my dwelling house in New York with all outhouses, yards, gardens and privileges and appurtenances thereof or therewith in any wise pertaining to be to her and her assigns during her naturall life, and after her decease the remainder thereof unto my three children Isaac, Peter and Mary, i.e., to each of them one third part thereof to them and their heirs forever.

Then I do hereby give and bequeath unto my two sons Isaac and Peter, to each of them £100 out of the debts which shall be owing to me at my decease, and this is to advance them in a suitable proportion to my loving daughter Mary Morin, to whom I have already given considerable.

Then I give and bequeath unto my three children aforesaid, Isaac, Peter and Mary, all the rest and residue of my Estate Real and Personal, to be to each of them one third part, to them and their heirs forever.

Provided, and I do hereby order and ordain that before my sd wife and children divide the goods and chattels I shall leave at my decease, according to the tenour of this my last will and testament, Ten Pounds thereof shall be given and delivered unto the French Church in New York for the use of the poor of the French Church in New York.

Finally I do nominate and appoint my dear and loving wife Joanne, Executrix, and my loving son-in-law Samuel Morin, Executor of this my last will and testament, and in witness of the aforesaid written as my last will and testament, I have herunto set my hand and seal this sixth day of November and in the first year of the reign of George of Great Britain and King. Anno domini 1714.

Before the sealing hereof, I further add that all the estate aforesaid in this will given to my two sons Isaac and Peter, I give the use thereof unto my loving wife untill they shall severally come to be of Ye age of twenty one years, to enable her to educate them and at their severall ages of twenty one years, they shall receive their several portions.

The widow accepts of the trust of Executrix to ye within, also declares her acceptance of wt her desed husband have given her by ye within will and acquits her dowry by law.

Witnesses: John Reed, (who was a gentleman of importance in the Colony and towns of Fairfield and Norwalk).

Antoni Nouquier, (who was a wealthy Frenchman who resided at Fairfield and who left £200 to Yale, £200 to the Congregational Church of Fairfield and £150 to the town poor).

John Green, (after whom Green's Farms was named).

Issue:-

1. Mario Anne Quintard. Born in Bristol, England, January 5/1695, baptized in the Chapel of the Gaunt, January 13/1695. She married Captain Samuel Morin, son of Jean and Elizabeth (Viconte) Morin, born January 19/1691-2, died at Stamford, June 19/1739, leaving an estate of about £1500, to his wife, and if there was anything left at her death, it was to go to his nephew John Morin of New York. In several records, the name is spelled Morine.

ISAAC QUINTARD.

2. Isaac Quintard. Born in Bristol, December 12/1698, baptized in the Chapel of the Gaunt on December 13/1698, died in Stamford, February 28/1738-9. He married on July 16/1716, Hannah Knapp, born March 10/1699, died 1790. See subject 112 for issue and further particulars.

3. Abraham Quintard. Born in New York City, baptized September 25/1698, in the French Church du St Esprit, by Monsieur Pieret. He died young.

4. Pierre Quintard. Born in New York City, January 14/1699-1700, baptized in the French Church du St Esprit, January 28/1699-1700, died at Norwalk November 10/1762, buried in St Pauls Cemetery. Pierre, or Peter as he was later called, settled in Norwalk in 1737-8, where he made several land purchases, appearing to select his home seat in the meadows somewhat north of the present Marshall St in South Norwalk. He was the progenitor of the Norwalk Quintards and his elder brother Isaac was the progenitor of the extensive Stamford Quintards. All the Quintards in the United States are descended from one or the other of these two men.

He married, 1st, in 1723, Jeanne Baillereau (or Ballereau), born in New York City, July 3/1708, died at Norwalk, September 2/1757, buried in St Pauls Cemetery, daughter of Jacques and Jeanne (Odart) Baillereau. Jacques, in his will dated September 12/1733, signed himself as James Ballereau, a ship carpenter, and now of the town of Rye, N.Y. Jacques left his estate "to his wife Jane, if she remain unmarried, but if she should come to matrimony with any other person whatsoever, then she should have the use of one third, and the other two thirds would go to his children Jane, Mary and Hannah, except one gold ring which he gave to Jane for priority of birth, and in the meantime, they which were not married, were to be educated and brought up in trades and learning, as his estate might allow". He made his wife Jane and his son-in-law Pierre Quintard, and his daughter Mary, his executors.

Pierre Quintard married, 2nd, Deborah Knapp, born January 25/1705, daughter of John and Hannah (Ferris) Knapp, and widow of William King, born September 8/1703, died December 23/1753, whom she had married on December 1/1726, and by whom she had eight children, see subject 122. Deborah was about 52 years old when Pierre married her, and Pierre was about 60 years old. Deborah was the sister of Hannah Knapp who married Pierre's elder brother Isaac.

I quote the following interesting article in the "American Decorator", of December 1941, by Thomas Hamilton Ormsbee, giving some details of Peter's life:- "Today, if a passenger on the New Haven Railway glances out of the window as the train thunders past South Norwalk and across the bridge which spans the harbor, he will see a drab cluster of 1880 business buildings and manufacturing plants. These will give no clue to an earlier scene when examples of American handicraft, now highly prized by collectors, were made on the same site. Two hundred years ago this was called "Old Well", one of the lesser settlements of Norwalk, and here lived and worked Pierre Quintard, the American born Huguenot silversmith. But in addition, he was a ship owner, tavern keeper, and may have been interested in the first Norwalk pottery. Peter was born in New York City and in due time was apprenticed to a silversmith, who was probably one of the craftsmen and may well have been Charles Le Roux, New York's leading silversmith. He was Quintard's senior by ten years. As evidence but not proof of Le Roux tutelage, there is a tankard bearing the marks of both Charles Le Roux and Peter Quintard. By 1731, Peter was listed as a freeman and a gold smith. There is a record of land transferred to him as

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early as 1722, described as on the south side of Maiden Lane, New York City, with a frontage of 21 feet. There is a caudle cup bearing the mark of P.Q. and bought by Sergeant Jonathan Gold of Stamford, now owned by the First Congregational Church there: the inscription states that it was presented in 1730. Peter remained in New York until 1737 working at his trade and conducting an occasional sale of real estate, such as one advertised in the New York Gazette of July 7-14/1735, reading:- "A good house and lot belonging to the widow Bellarow, whereon there is a good stable and other out buildings, a good pump in the yard and a good garden. Whoever inclines to buy the same may apply to Peter Quintard, Goldsmith, living in the New Dutch Church in the city of New York. Two years later he had removed to Norwalk, only a few miles distant from his brother Isaac in Stamford. Quintard's silver, though simple, was well wrought and compared favorably with that of his contemporaries."

His will, dated August 26/1762 in the Probate Records of Fairfield reads in part as follows:- "I give to my well beloved wife Deborah, as her right of Dower, the use of my Dwelling House, Barn and Shop, and the Home Lot, during ye term of her widowhood, and all my household goods, that part which she brought me, as her own forever, and ye rest so long as she shall remain my widow. I also give to her the use of half my woodland to get her firing during her widowhood. I give to my son Peter, his heirs, &c, all my goldsmith tools and my lot called Crampland, about 20 acres, situated in sd Norwalk, and also my Rock, so called, at ye head of the harbour of sd Norwalk, containing eight rods, bounded east by ye river or creek, west by highway, north by Thomas Helden's lot, and south by Jonathan Burrell's lot, together with a third part of my Home Lot and buildings thereon, and household goods if any left and not worn out by good usage at my wife's decease or marrying again. The other two thirds of my Home Lot, house, goods, &c, in like manner I give to my two daughters Mary Evertson and Jane Vanwoner, both of New York, to be possessed by my three children above mentioned, after my wife according to my above bequest, has done with what I have given her, with this proviso or condition that my three children, do each of them or their heirs, pay off my debts and funeral charges, in case my money, goldsmith truck and tavern stores, are not sufficient to pay all my debts and charges. Each child to pay in proportion to what I, by this will, have given, and if any refuse, their portion shall be sold for that purpose and the overplus be returned to him or her that refuse to pay their part of my debts as above. And, lastly, that this my will may be duly executed, I do recommend, constitute and ordain and appoint Mr Jonathan Ketchum of said Norwalk and my son Peter and my wife Deborah, executors to this, my will.----".

According to the inventory of the estate, Peter left upwards of £600 to his heirs, which was a fair sized amount for the mid eighteenth century. For all his interest in outside affairs, Peter must have made a fair quantity of silver, but pieces bearing his mark are very rare. None have come down in his family. There is a tankard and a caster in the Mabel Brady Garvan collection at Yale University. While none of his descendants followed the goldsmith craft, artistic ability and business enterprise did not die with him: others of the family became cabinet makers and were prime movers in the well known Norwalk Potteries of the early 19th century".

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Issue:-

1. Jacques (James) Quintard, born February 6/1723-4. He must have died before his father as he was not mentioned in his will.
2. Marie (Mary) Quintard, born May 23/1726. She married Evert Evertson of New York City. No other data.
- 3. Pierre (Peter) Quintard, born July 22/1732, died August 23/1813, aged 81 years. He came to Norwalk with his father, soon after his birth: who his first wife was, has not been ascertained. He married, 2nd, on May 23/1774, at the Darien Congregational Church, Ruth Stevens of Stamford, who died between the date of her will February 9/1815, and its probate on June 12/1821. Peter left an estate of \$229.00, which was not sufficient to pay his debts of \$1041.52. Letters of administration were granted to his wife Ruth on October 5/1813. Ruth left an estate of \$155.44, equally between her three children, Clarissa, Rebecca and Lewis.

Issue:- (by his first wife, name unknown)

- 1. James H. Quintard, baptized October 16/1758, died September 23/1825, buried in Pine Island Cemetery, Norwalk. He was a pensioner of the Revolutionary War from 1818. He married, 1st, Sarah Raymond, born March 10/1763, died March 27/1806, daughter of Deacon Nathan and Rebecca (Benedict) Raymond: 2nd, Sally Hilliard of Redding, Conn., who died August 31/1825. She was a White, a lineal descendant of Peregrine White. His history is so long that I am putting it under Subject 224-A.
2. Evert Quintard, born November 1/1761, died August 12/1833, buried in Pine Island Cemetery, Norwalk. He married on November 10/1790, Hannah Raymond, born June 6/1770, died August 16/1846, sister of his elder brother James' wife. After Evert's death, she married, 2nd, a Mr Hamlin: no Hamlin genealogy mentions this marriage. His history is so long I am putting it under Subject 224-B.
3. Peter Quintard, born 1765, died April 11/1832, buried in Pine Island Cemetery, Norwalk. He served in the Revolutionary War, and was not married. I can find no other details about him.
4. Isaac Quintard, born in Norwalk about 1767, died February 5/1856. He married on November 13/1793, Elizabeth Pickett, born January 14/1769, died August 18/1818, daughter of Ezra and Elizabeth (Benedict) Pickett, and grand daughter of James and Deborah (Stuart) Pickett. I am putting his history under Subject 224-C.

Issue:- (by his second wife Ruth Stevens)

5. Clarissa Quintard, born 1775, died November 2/1848, buried at Norwalk. She married Stephen Mott, born October 24/1771, died November 12/1848, son of Reuben and Phebe (Tuttle) Mott of New Canaan, Conn., probably of the Long Island Mott family. I am putting her descendants under Subject 224-D.
6. Rebecca Quintard, born between 1776 and 1781. Seller says she married a Mr Raymond of New York City but gives no date or other details. Her mother's will of February 9/1815 names her as Rebecca Raymond. The Hoyt Genealogy states that Polly (Quintard) Raymond married, 2nd, about 1794, as his second wife, Elijah Hoyt, born March 12/1766, whose first wife was Sally Lawrence, who died in childbirth on July 18/1787, in giving birth to Daniel Hoyt who married Abigail Raymond. Elijah was the son of Elijah and his first wife Mary (Raymond) Hoyt of Norwalk. Whether Polly and Rebecca were the same, I don't know: for their children, see the Hoyt Genealogy by David W. Hoyt.

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He married Cornelia Bowman, born February 20/1799, died January 18/1887, buried in Green Wood Cemetery, Brooklyn, daughter of George Bowman of New York, who lived in Hanover, Morris County, N.J., and who died between 1837 and 1840. In 1871-2, Cornelia lived at 23 Christopher St., New York City.

Issue:-

1. Maria Louisa Quintard, born November 14/1821, died July 27/1899 buried in Green Wood Cemetery. She was not married.

4. Jeanno (Jane) Quintard, baptized October 24/1738. She married at Albany, N.Y., on June 25/1761, Henricus Van Wageningen, born in New York City, November 12/1736, died before 1776, son of Gerritt and Teuntjo (Van den Borg) Van Wageningen of Kingston, N.Y. Henricus was a hatter in Albany.

Issue:-

1. Gorrit Van Wageningen, baptized March 3/1762, died March 22/1793, buried in Trinity Churchyard, New York, close to the western boundary of the churchyard on the north side of the church. His estate was valued at £150, and in the letters of administration of his estate, his wife was named Hannah ---.

2. Jane Van Wageningen. She married about 1790, Henry Raymond of Old Woll, Norwalk, who died in Louisville, Ky., about 1865. After his death, Jane resided at 99 Church St, New York City, and then moved to Brooklyn with her daughter Mrs Thorne, after whose death she went to Louisville with her daughter Sarah and died there at an advanced age.

Issue:- (may not be complete)

1. Henry Raymond, born November 6/1791 in New York City, died in Jersey City, September 19/1878. He was a carpenter and builder, and was later employed in the Custom House. In 1812, by special Act of Congress, he was brevetted Brigadier General for his services during the war, and for many years after, was a Commissioner of the Veterans.

2. Gerrit Raymond.

3. Hubert Raymond.

4. Teunis Raymond.

5. Jane Raymond. She married Mr Hazel of Baltimore and died 1849.

6. Mary Raymond. Died December 30/1831, unmarried.

7. Catherine Raymond. She married Richard J. Thorne on December 30/1831, who was born February 3/1800.

8. Sarah Raymond. Not married and lived in Louisville, Ky.

9. Samuel Wilkinson Raymond, born 1798, died 1875. He married on January 8/1821, Mary Voorhis, born 1802.

JAMES H. QUINTARD.

Was the oldest son of Pierre Quintard and his first wife, name unknown, see subject 224, page 5.

James was baptized on October 16/1758, and died at Norwalk, Conn., September 23/1825, buried in Pine Island Cemetery, Norwalk. He lived in the last house, east, on the north side of the present Marshall Street, in South Norwalk. He there kept an inn which bordered on the old Quintard Dock. This dock, in the days of the Vanderbilt-Peck steamboat opposition, was the landing place of the Vanderbilt boat: the Peck line moored its boat at the Day Dock, at the foot of the present Washington Street. It was because the Vanderbilt & Drew people failed to influence the Norwalk Stage Coach proprietors to drive their vehicles first to the Quintard Dock, before proceeding to the Peck line pier, that Drew started a coach line of his own. The Quintard Inn was the only public house at that time. Its sign, suspended from a bracket over the door, enjoined:-

Since man to man is so unjust,
You cannot tell what man to trust.
I've trusted many to my sorrow,
So pay today and trust tomorrow.

The Connecticut State Library Records state that James was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, and that he was taken prisoner at the Battle of Long Island, and was confined in the British prison ship "Jersey". The following winter he was with Washington at Valley Forge and shared in all the hardships of that terrible campaign. He was a pensioner from 1818.

He married, 1st, Sarah Raymond, born March 10/1763, died March 27/1806, daughter of Deacon Nathan and Rebecca (Benedict) Raymond; 2nd, Sally Hilliard of Redding, Conn., who died August 31/1825. She was a lineal descendant of Peregrine White, the first white child born in this country - see History of the "Mayflower".

Issue:- (by his first wife Sarah Raymond)

1. William Quintard. Born June 1781, died January 8/1791, buried in Pine Island Cemetery, Norwalk.

2. James Quintard. Born at Norwalk, October 12/1786, died there February 29/1848, buried in Pine Island Cemetery. He was engaged in the pottery business. The Society for the preservation of New England Antiquities" Vol 24, No 4, of April 1934, in an article on the Norwalk Potteries, by Andrew L. and Kate Barber Winton, profusely illustrated with specimens of Norwalk pottery articles, states under the heading of "Quintard Potteries":- Between 1825 and 1835, there were five potteries within the boundaries of Norwalk township, each fully equipped, although not all were in operation throughout the period. The Hoyt Pottery, located at "the village", the earliest of the five historic potteries, which may have been built before the Revolution, appears to have fallen into disuse sometime before 1820. Early in the last decade of the 18th century, Abaalom Day came from Chatham, N.J., where he had learned the pottery trade, to Old Well Norwalk, where he started a pottery which declined in the thirties and disappeared soon after. In addition, the Quintard, Smith, and Gregory Potteries, were in existence during part or all of the time between the dates mentioned. The last years of the Hoyt Pottery, were probably the first years of the Day Pottery, and the last years of the Day Pottery, were the first years of the Smith Pottery, and included practically the whole period of the Quintard and Gregory Potteries. A workman learned his trade in one pottery, and moved to another, or went into business for himself. Competition on the one

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hand, and the friendly exchange of ideas among owners bound by blood ties, on the other, tended in a degree to destroy individuality. The Quintard Pottery was within a stone's throw of the Day Pottery at the northwest corner of North Water and Marshall Streets, South Norwalk, on land occupied in 1946 by the lumber yard and office of Hatch & Bailey; the Quintard Dock was near by. The first intimation of its existence is the following advertisement in the "Gazette" of May 1825, reading:- The connection in the earthenware manufacturing business between Henry Chichester and James Quintard, under the firm name of Chichester & Quintard, is by mutual consent this day dissolved. The business will hereafter be carried on under the name of Quintard, Merrill & Co., by the undersigned James Quintard, Marion Merrill, and Henry Chichester, Jr. Nine years later, on August 19/1834, the "Gazette" carried the following notice:- The connection in the pottery business, heretofore existing between James Quintard and Henry Chichester, Jr., is this day dissolved by mutual consent. Few records exist of the articles made by the Quintard Pottery, but they included sugar cones, red ware knobs, large red ware coat buttons, some of which are on exhibition at the Hartford Museum. Mrs Burgis D. Jennings of Norwalk has some specimens. The Quintard Pottery also made large jars for sailing vessels plying to the West Indies, in which to carry their water. The Norwalk potteries shipped great quantities to the western States, going by boat from the Quintard Dock. As the western potteries developed, notably those in Ohio, the Norwalk potteries gradually declined, being unable to compete with the new potteries in the western States. The dwelling house of James Quintard in Norwalk, was one of the fine modelled homes of the day. He married on May 28/1807, Sally Chichester, born at Norwalk, February 12/1787, died there April 26/1859, buried in Pine Island Cemetery, daughter of Henry and Deborah (Hoyt) Chichester.

Issue:-

1. Margaret Quintard, born at Norwalk, May 6/1813, died there January 30/1889. She never married.
2. James A. Quintard, born at Norwalk, December 18/1814, died there April 15/1887. New Haven Directories of 1850-2, listed him as living there, and his occupation a knob maker. In 1875-6 he was boarding at 43 Hammond Park, Boston, his occupation a crucible maker. In 1878 his wife was boarding there with him. In 1882 he roomed at 85 Green St, Brookline: in 1885 he was a clerk and lived at 17 Norman St, near North Station, Boston. In 1888 he boarded at 218 Western Ave, Allston. He married in Norwalk on November 16/1834, Eunice B. Hoyt, born at Norwalk, April 20/1813, died April 18/1888. She boarded at 18 Highland Park Ave, Roxbury: in 1884-5 at 71 West Brookline: 1884-5 at 16 Atherton St, Brookline.

Issue:-

1. Harriet Virginia Quintard, born at Norwalk, May 14/1836, died at Portland, Maine, in 1918. She married at Ridgefield, Conn., on August 15/1858, George Comstock Mead, born December 19/1830, died at Boston, May 20/1883, son of Russell and Mary A. (Dunning) Mead, of Ridgefield. He started his career as a buss boy at the St James Hotel, East Somerville, Boston. In 1873, George was first a steward, then manager of the Tremont House, Boston, where he worked until 1877. In 1879 he was a partner in Doyle & Mead, with offices at the St James Hotel, East Somerville, and boarded

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there until 1880. In 1881 he lived at 11 School St., Eggleston Square, Boston.

Issue:-

1. Florence Quintard Mead, born July 21/1859, died at Bedford, Mass., January 12/1913. She married at Boston on June 25/1884, Frederick William Hamilton, born at Portland, Me., March 30/1860, died at Medford, Mass., in May 1940, son of Jonas and Angelina Sombardo (Sawyer) Hamilton. Educated at Public Schools in Portland, he graduated from Tufts College in 1880, and began his career with a short service with the Portland & Ogdensburg Railway until 1889.
