

Mackintosh of Mackintosh

Duncan McDuff, Thane of Fife

Duncan McDuff, 3rd Earl of Fife, 2nd son:

Shaw (or Sheagh) sent by King Malcolm IV in 1163 to suppress rebellion in Morayland, succeeded and was rewarded with Constabulary of Castle Inverness where he was soon called Mac-in-tosh-ich (Thane's son)

Angus Mackintosh ^{1282 m.} Eva, only d. + h. of Dougal Phaul, Captain of Clan Chattan; eldest son + heir:

William Mackintosh, Captain of Clan Chattan, added "or, a lymphad sable" to his family arms (for Clan Chattan); received barony of Moy and a lease dated 19 Mar. 1347 for Rothiemurchus; son

Malcolm Mackintosh (heir to his nephew), ^{chief} a, commander at Battle of Harlow in 1411; appointed Constable + Keeper of Inverness Castle in 1428 by King James I.

GORDON

Richard de Gordon made charter to Abbey of Kelso 1150; his descendant

Sir Adam de Gordon had grant of Stichell, Roxburghshire from King Robert 28 June 1315; son in 1320 received Strathbolgie forfeited by David, Earl Atholl; eldest son:

William de Gordon received Stichell from his father; 1358 received from Robert II, King's new Forest of Glenkens in Galloway; son:

Roger de Gordon, son

Alexander de Gordon, infelt 24 Jan 1403 in lands of Kenmuire; son

Roger de Gordon, son

William de Gordon of Stichell and Lochinvar; settled in Galloway 1440, m. 1434 Lady Malise Graham, dau. of Earl of Strathearn; 2 sons.

1. Sir John Gordon, Laird of Lochinvar, armour bearer to the King (1492 m. @ Annabella, dau. of Robert, Lord Boyd, (son Alexander, ^{+ Flodden 1513} heir); m. @ Eliz. Lindsay (3 sons 2 daus.)

2. Alexander Gordon of Auchencrook (several sons including 3rd son: Roger Gordon of Barri whose 2nd son James Gordon bought Auchendally in 1645 from Kenmuire Gordon
