Enclosed are the following items which I promised to gather and send to you:

2. A copy of the three-page summary of the nine-month "research" conducted for me by Robert's - a dearth of detail and feast of "warmed over cabbage" at best. My quest for Capt. Wm Lawton will continue, however, and you will be one of the first to receive whatever information I discover.
3. A copy of the receipt for Mary Pickling's coffin, which was constructed by her grandson, B. J. P. Lawton, your ancestor. It is proof that she died in December

of 1803, rather in January of 1804, as we  
have for so long believed.

4. A copy of the abstract of the Will of

John Milam, father of your Thomas —

the same John we discussed over the  
phone, is it not? I shall be eager to  
hear what you have to say about this  
item. Mrs. Brownlee tells me that  
nearly every Milam researcher she has  
ever contacted believes (or had formerly  
believed) that this John Milam died  
in Halifax Co., Va.

5. Some miscellaneous Milam material  
I have received from either, either  
and you over the years. On skimming  
through it again I noticed nothing  
obvious that would help with the  
connection you are attempting to make  
between Thomas and Colman, but  
perhaps you will find some clue I  
have overlooked. Mrs. Brownlee is  
going to be on the lookout for any-  
thing that might be of help to you also,  
as she continues my Milam research.

She told me this afternoon over the phone that Thomas Milam was supposedly twice married, and that Coleman was a child of the first marriage. If anyone can resolve your enigma, it is surely she.

6. Copies of three pedigree charts — mine, my mother's and my half-sister's, which should give you a clear picture of my Lawrence connections — and also my Lawrence "stone wall" research problem. Any help or suggestions you can offer on my great-great grandfather Niastaphus, will be a boon which Mrs. Brownlee and I will certainly appreciate. This W. M. Milam has been as elusive as Capt. Wm. Lawton, though not for as long. Mrs. Leavell in Dallas is the only person who has ever heard of W. M. Milam, other than Mrs. Brownlee.

Again, it was a pleasure to chat with you over the phone this weekend, and I eagerly look forward to meeting you and Miss Cera soon. Please give her my warmest regards.
