Anson deeds, Jan. 15, 1763: Henry Touchstone to Frederick Touchstone for 20 pounds, 250 acres on "east side of Little River" at "Lake Island," granted John Francis, and from him to Richard Touchstone, from Richard Touchstone descended to Henry Touchstone, Heir-at-Law; adj. Christopher Touchstone; part of grant was conveyed to Stephen Touchstone by Richard. Wit.: Matthew Raiford, Charles Robinson. (Robertson) John Francis from Wales, June 21, 1746, died 1798, killed by the Indians, was at Welch Neck, S. C. (Society Hill), sold land to the Touchstones. (Va. Militia) Charles Robertson b. 1740, Md., died Tenn., 1798, was Major and Judge (p. 345 Va. D.A.R.), represented Richmond Co., N. C., in the House of Commons in 1784-street named for him in Rockingham, N. C.) Matthew Raiford had a "ford over Little River where Cross Creek Road crossed Little River, 1771." (p. 73, McBee, Anson Deeds.) THE TOUCHSTONES HAD A MILL AT "LAKE ISLAND," 1768 (LITTLE'S MILL TODAY) In 1768, Henry Williams received a grant of 200 acres of land at "Lake Island" in Anson Co., "on the east side of Little River," beginning at a black oak "on the hillside, about 1 and 1/2 miles above Touchstone's Mill," dated 25 Jan. 1768, Robert Edwards, Surv. This is "about 1 and 1/2 miles above Little's Mill" on the east side, today . . taking the road that leads to Ex-Way . . . travel about this distance and "on top of the hill," is a very old settled place. d. 1725 Goodfand Co, Va. THE LEAKE FAMILY The Leake family came to America in the person of William bibby nottingham, Eng Leake (a first cousin of the distinguished admiral, Sir John Leake, created Earl Scare date 1645) who settled in what is known as Essex Co., Va., in 1685. (Spottsyl-187

vania Co., formed from Essex in 1720, Essex formed in 1692, name changed from Rappahannock Co., which was the old Tidewater Co., and not the Rappahannock of today.)

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WILLIAM AND MARY BOSTIC LEAKE came to America in 1685, married in England. (The Bostic family was outstanding in England and Maryland. See affidavit of the Presbyterian Elders of Maryland to Col. Thomas Dockery, 1769, p. 143... John Bostic, Elder in Elk Presbyterian Church, Md.) "Bostic Branch" was mentioned in a grant by his Majesty, King George, to John Cole in 1767, "leading from Matthew Raiford Bridge," (on Little River) to Bostic Branch." William Bostic b. 1750, Dover, Del., died in Morgan Co., Ga., 1811 (p. 434 Va. D.A.R.) Gen. George Graham's nephew, Marcus H. Bostick, died at the Battle of Manassas. (See p. 133.) Children of William and Mary Bostic Leake: (Among them.)

- (1) WALTER LEAKE m. Judith Mask. He was born 1704. (See Vol. X, p. 127-129, Colonial Records of N. C.) Mask Ferry was a famous crossing over the Pee Dee River during the Rev. War. Robert J. Steele's grant in 1798 (see p. 132), mentions the Mask tract. James Cotton was captured and brought to Mask Ferry where the Rev. soldiers encamped. Matthew Covington in his Rev. War affidavit referred to Mask Ferry on page 69. James Marshall b. 1735, Brunswick Co., Va., died 1818, (Will) Anson Co., named his grandson, William Mask. Children: (among them)

C. 1801, Major William Pickett; Joseph Martin; David Parsons, John Smith, Lieut. Col., b. 1710, d. 1782, Johnston Co., N. C., near Lillington; Andrew Randle b. Thomas Chiles, who in 1772, had a land grant on Little River, which was completely surrounded by John Roe's grant No. 199, file 4161, 200 acres, known as "Roe's Hazard" on N.E. side of Little River, beg: "at river bank up various courses to Thomas Chiles corner, surv. 27 May, 1772, by William Love, D.S. John Roe willed 200 acres in 1780 to Rachel, the wife of "Ram Billy Thomas," and 200 acres to Samuel Salisbury Chears, his grandson. It was Sophia Chears who m. Robert Webb, long time member of the

Legislature from Richmond County. (See Olds Wills, John Webb 1794, and p. 45, 169, this book.)

Michael Wall died in 1863, so Capt. Everett knew, without a doubt, this bit of history . . . that Mary Wall married John Covington (2) and not William (1).

ELLERBE SPRINGS OF LONG AGO

Thomas Crawford Leake died in 1923. He owned the famous Ellerbe Springs Hotel and Recreation Center, which the people of Rchmond County enjoyed for over a hundred years. Col. William Ellerbe of Cheraw, S. C. (Will 1820), purchased the springs in 1803 from Michael Crawford, son of John, Sr. Rev. John McFarlan, Pres. Minister, had a summer cottage there. (His wife was Rebecca Ellerbe, dau. of Thomas Ellerbe, Capt. in Rev. War, a bro. of Col. Wlliam.) Mrs. Margaret Bethune, age 91, was buried at the "Fairgrounds" in 1838, so stated the old Harmony Church records, organized in 1800, and moved to Ellerbe Springs. Until a few years ago, this large white church stood on the hill, with its slave gallery, and a few early graves nearby. Now stands on this sacred spot, a Rest Center. Mrs. Margaret

Bostic Bethune was the grandmother of Bethune Bostic McKenzie b. 1807, son of Kenneth McKenzie, an elder in the old church.

The Supreme Court Records in 1872 stated: "Bethune Bostic McKenzie, W. L. Covington, and John W. Leake, sureties for the bond of Rev. J. A. Covington in 1857, Adm., of the estate of John P. Covington, "three of the most solvent men in Richmond County."

(8) Frank Leake, b. 1871, m. Gertie Webb, sister of Crawford Webb. Henry C. Webb m. Gertie Alden, dau. of Mrs. Frank Alden, who m. (2) Thos. B. Covington, b. 1845, d. 1926, son of W. L. Covington (46). Judge A. A. Webb now serving in the District Courts, son of Henry C. Webb, is a grandson of Stephen Webb. Dr. W. P. Webb, father of Addie and Carey Webb, is a kinsman-all can be traced back to Henry Covington (1) this book.

OTHER ENTERPRISES OF THE LEAKE FAMILY

Did the Leake family come into possession of the Mask Ferry over the Pee Dee River, following the Rev. War? The 1911, Richmond County map shows the Leake Ferry at or about the same location. Other enterprises of the Leake famly were: The Leake, Wall and McRae Mfg. Company, the Bank of Pee Dee, and the Richmond County Savings Bank.

IVY FROM WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE'S TOMB

In 1928, Mrs. Nancy Pegues Leake on her return from a trip to England, sent a few sprigs of Ivy from the tomb of William Shakespeare to the author of this book, who, at that time, was County Home Agent with the State College Extension Dept., Washington Co., Plymouth, N. C.

With special ceremony, apropos the occasion, the Ivy was planted by a corner of the historical old town's court house. At that very moment, the famous dirigible, Los Angeles, floated serenely by on its airborne voyage down the great Roanoke River. Today, the Ivy covered walls of the old court house afford a picturesque place for politicians making campaign speeches,

POST OFFICES 1872

The Raleigh Register gives the following Post Offices, 1872: Bear Branch, where Rev. Frank Sanford had a school, Bostic Mill (above Ellerbe), Capel Mill, Covington, Laurel Hill, Laurinburg, Little's Mill, Mangum (formerly Goose Pond), Powellton, Powhatan, Rockingham. (No Hamlet or Ellerbethe 1850 map shows "Fair Grounds" where the General Assembly decreed that Fairs should be held for exchange of commodities, about 1792.

MERCHANTS IN ROCKINGHAM, 1874

The population of Rockingham in 1874 was 454. Merchants in town: 1872, Covington-Everett. (This was John Euclid Covington (9A2-1) and Capt. W. I. Everett). Col. John W. Leake was Pres. of Great Falls Mfg. Co., with R. L.

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
