### Letter from the President

A number of important things have happened in the last few months. One was the appointment of Linda Piekut as **Executive Director** and to the Board of the Heritage Library Foundation. It is a "recess appointment" which can be confirmed by the Board at the next annual meeting. Linda is tech-savvy, experienced in project management, and a valuable, much-needed addition to the HLF staff.

### **Legendary Locals**

I have been working on a book for Arcadia Publishing, scheduled to be published next spring, on *Legendary Locals of Hilton Head*. Many of those legendary locals came to Hilton Head Island during the Fraser years and participated in a unique development philosophy that has become recognized world-wide, and in gathering materials for the book I realized we were about to lose a very important part of our history. Furthermore, since the book is mainly images and captions, it does not allow for any in-depth treatment of the individuals or the philosophy. Finally, I was not able to secure photographs acceptable to the publisher for some of the key players.

### Encyclopedia Hilton Head

Out of all this was born the concept of Encyclopedia Hilton Head (EHH). Back in Virginia, I had done a little work for Encyclopedia Virginia, and believed that such a project could capture for the future a fascinating history that would also be an authoritative resource for researchers and scholars. We have received a grant from the Community Foundation of the Lowcountry for a portion of the work.

Piggy-backing on that is a concept Linda Piekut is overseeing, the development of a phone app for visitors to the city which will contain information for history

for the local genealogy society at the new public library failed to materialize, Randy Holcomb, vice president, right, urged members of the society, then a chapter of the national society, to form a library of their own, in a separate foundation. It was easier to do

that than to go through the national group.

E. A. "Bill' Altstaetter (left) was the other vice president, and he continued to serve on the Board throughout all fifteen years. He is our institutional memory, having served in just about every official capacity

### Heritage Library – The First 15 Years

The Heritage Library Foundation's original books came from the Genealogy Society's library, approximately 100 books located in a Seabrook closet. The Society's librarian, Betsey Wolf, known on Hilton Head Island as "Ms Genealogy," had organized the books alphabetically. When a Genealogy Society member wanted a book, the Seabrook receptionist would give him the closet key. Then the struggle began. Seabrook sponsored Bingo on Monday evenings and their Bingo paraphernalia was stored on a cart placed at the front of the closet library. The bulky, heavy cart had to be moved before a member could access a book. Very few members used the library.

Two Society members owned a great many genealogy books. One member stored half of his books in his garage because his library had grown too large for his house. They wished to donate their books to the Society. So, the Society wanted to find a location where all of these books would comprise their library.

In 1997, at the urging of Randy Holcombe, a retiree from up north, the Heritage Library Foundation was created. Article I of the Bylaws states, "The Heritage Library Foundation...organized to promote the study of history and genealogy, to support, organize, and maintain a private historical and genealogical library..."



In July, 1997 the Library opened in a 9'x12' room in the Courtyard Building with one computer, about 1,500 books, and 23 founding members. Society meetings were held at the Seabrook until the fall of 1998. The Library grew: six months later, 1,000 square feet – three years later, 2,000

square feet – ten more years, 2,800 square feet., the current size of the Library which now has in excess of 4,000 books, numerous computers and 341 members. Foundation meetings are held at the Library and the Foundation makes its meeting space available to organizations as part of its Community Outreach Mission.

A library computer program was purchased from Library World and Randy Holcombe started cataloguing the collection. In 2000 Isobel Bitner, a professional librarian, joined the Library's volunteer staff. She tackled the huge job of cataloguing everything in the Library using the Dewey classification system, with some modifications to suit the Library's special

needs. The next year Nancy Burke, also a professional librarian, became a Library volunteer and now serves as Head Librarian and on the Education Committee.

In 2005 the Hilton Head Historical Society became part of the Heritage Library Foundation. They brought with them books, a bank account, responsibility for Fort Mitchel and Zion Chapel of Ease Cemetery, and 60 members who became life members of the Foundation.

Since 2005, the Library has grown thanks to contributions from generous patrons, among them Dr. Robert Peeples who has given the Library his genealogical/historical books, articles he has written, and his pertinent correspondence. Randy Holcombe has given the Library the Barbour Collection, a research series which is organized by towns and serves as an index and an abstract of pre-1850 Connecticut vital records (births, marriages and deaths). The Library purchased the Mayflower series which tracks Mayflower families through five generations: descendants of the Pilgrims who landed at Plymouth, MA in December 1620. The library currently has 23 volumes of this series and a standing order for any future volumes.

In addition to books, the Library Catalog listing now includes maps, CDs, and microfilm collections. Isobel Bitner and Nancy Burke are responsible for all cataloguing. We also offer access to websites containing important genealogical material.

An impressive 15 years.



### Our History Division Was Busy in 2012

An in-depth study of the extensive and rich history of Hilton Head and surrounding islands of the Low Country served as the focus of the educational programs presented throughout 2012 by the Library's History Division.

The winter term, mid-January to Heritage Classic Week, included a six-session study of the Island's history from Pre-Columbian American Indian cultures to the incorporation of the modern Town of Hilton Head Island in 1983. Lecturers included Bill Altstaetter, Norman Harberger, and Natalie Hefter.

Other programs covered a variety of subjects: "Was Doctor Hawley Crippen a Murderer?" given by descendant Patrick Crippen; two talks by the Foundation's past president, Bob Smith, during the February Black History celebration, "South Carolina, Cradle of Secession" and "Mitchelville—Then and Now"; a shift in focus let us meet some of the more notable "Crowned Heads of Europe," introduced by Dalton Parker. The winter term programs concluded with a highlight event, "Afternoon Tea with Eliza Pinckney." Eliza, portrayed by Peggy Pickett in period dress, charmed the packed house with her discussion of her plantation life with "Mister Pinckney" in 18th-century South Carolina, and her development of indigo.

In our Community Outreach, the History Division provided guest lecturers to a number of Island organizations including two talks at the Country Club of Hilton Head on the early plantations of the Island's north shore. A comparable talk to the Sea Pines Day Trippers encompassed plantations within modern Sea Pines.

Attendance at these programs was 229 for library sessions and 460 at the off site locations; a total of 689 Island residents and visitors.

During the months of June, July, August and September weekly tours of Fort Mitchel were offered in partnership with Coastal Discovery Museum, led by Bill Altstaetter, Lou Benfante, and Harry Eschenbach. Sixty-nine persons attended; 13 residents and 56 tourists (five from SC and 51 from out-of-state). Thanks to Natalie Hefter and the staff at Coastal Discovery for their invaluable participation in this successful venture into history tours. We are also pleased to continue to make Zion Cemetery available for their Patriots and Planters lectures which have been held for several years.

One program in October and two in November completed the History Division's lecture schedule for 2012. In

October Rosemary Staples appeared to a packed house, in period dress as Clara Barton, presenting an absorbing discussion of Clara's two visits to the Low Country; during the War Between the States and later to assist with the recovery from the 1893 Great Sea Hurricane. In November, Norm Harberger reprised his earlier discussion of modern day Hilton Head during the Charles Fraser years from the arrival of the "timber partners" following WWII to the present day.

Thanks to the volunteers who devoted time and energy sharing their experience and expertise to make 2012 an outstanding success, and to the volunteers taking care of our two historical sites, Fort Mitchel and the Zion Chapel of Ease Cemetery. Very special thanks to Ron Boyd, Harry Eschenbach, and David Schofield for helping me look after the needs of Fort Mitchel and to Barry Riordan who has been active in the planning and funding for renovations of the Baynard Mausoleum.

Also, thanks to Rick McDevitt of Ocean Woods Landscaping for his expertise and assistance providing groundskeeping services at both historic locations.

While the responsibility for managing the Foundation's history and genealogy research falls within the purview of the Head Librarian, I wish to recognize the historic significance of the contributions made this past year by Phyllis Boyd in updating the tombstone records at both Zion and Tailbird Cemeteries, John Griffin's work on the records of the US Colored Troops, and Paul and Marty Anthony's research of Island deaths during the years of the Civil War.

Thanks to History Division members who assisted Barbara Fleischmann, Priscilla Russo, and Iva Welton with their work on an application to place Zion Cemetery on the United States Register of Historic Places and to those who have promoted our history program at the Farmers' Market at Honey Horn.

Finally, thanks to all the members, officers and the outstanding volunteers of The Heritage Library for their friendship and support for my efforts; without you none of this would have been possible. It has been a genuine pleasure working with each of you over these last years as Chair of the History Division.

tours and can be used to develop other tours. Both projects can work from one database. The projects are eminently doable but will take a little time.

#### Mitchelville

We also are working on a new project, the **Original Mitchelville Initiative.** There were some 1500 souls who lived in Mitchelville while the army was here. When the army left in 1868, so did the jobs and many of the residents. Therefore they were not here to be counted in the 1870 census. Because it is believed that a large portion of today's African-American community had an ancestor who passed through Hilton Head (some say as high as 30 percent), finding even a fraction of the 1500 and their descendants could be a very exciting project. It will be tedious work, spooling through microfilm that has never been studied for this purpose, and will probably take years, but as every genealogist knows, it is tremendously rewarding when you suddenly break through the proverbial brick wall.

### 350/30: A Birthday Party for Hilton Head

Last year Bill Altstaetter pointed out to us that 2013 had two significant dates: the 350th anniversary of Captain William Hilton's voyage, and the 30th anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Hilton Head Island. Out of this was born the 350/30 celebration now being planned for 2013. Leslie Richardson is the organizing genius, and multiple events are being planned for the last week in September, involving almost every organization on the island.

Although we have all been working hard, creating all these new concepts, we are still struggling financially. We continue to apply for grants and seek gifts for operating capital. We are thoroughly convinced that we have in this Foundation something that is unique and worthy of support.
