A VERY USEFUL FREE PROGRAM!

Back Up My Tree

Back up My Tree, a new *free* and *easy* program, is available for download. It automatically finds and saves a copy of all family trees found on your hard drive. The program works with GEDCOM files, Family Tree Maker, PAF, Legacy Family Tree, RootsMagic (version 4 or later), Family Tree Builder, Family Tree Legends, Ancestral Quest, Ancestry Family Tree, and GenoPro. (Note: The program says that the Master Genealogist and Reunion for Mac are supported using manual upload through your Web browser, but currently there is no automatic upload for Macs). If you use Family Tree Maker, the photos you add are also backed up as part of the file. For the others, this feature is planned for the future.

Once you download the program and set it to automatically upload, you do not have to do anything else. You are *not* posting your tree for others to see; you are simply creating a backup copy stored safely outside of your computer. As changes are detected, the files are automatically backed up. You can also access your tree from any computer with internet access simply by signing in to your account.

You should always have an up-to-date backup of your tree stored someplace *other than the hard drive* of your computer. Both your computer and external hard drives can crash, CDs can get scratched, and often people just forget to back up. This free program does all the work for you.

I personally have recently started to use this program as another way to safely backup my trees. I strongly suggest that you look at this program and see if it might be helpful to you, too—especially if you currently do not have an automatic backup plan.
