350/50 Plans

The Heritage Library is producing the 350/30 Celebration that will be held from September 30 to October 5, 2013. Vital to its success is the support of our sponsors: the Town of Hilton Head Island, Coligny

Plaza, Hilton Head Hospital, and Palmetto Electric.

Planning for the 350/30 Celebration began in the spring of 2012 when Bill Altstaetter realized the significance of the two anniversaries that would converge in 2013. It is the 350th anniversary of the sighting of Hilton's Headlands by Captain William Hilton (1663), and the 30th anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Hilton Head Island (1983).

We at the Library decided to contact the Town to explore the idea of collaborating on some sort of program. It was at this point that Board member Beth Mayo asked Leslie Richardson to sit in on a planning meeting with the hope that she would contribute her remarkable planning and leadership skills. She plunged in immediately with characteristic enthusiasm and has been a sparkplug throughout the months of planning, including developing the logo for the event. The logo consists of crossed flags, one with the red ensign of ships of the Hilton era and one depicting the island on a green background symbolizing the environmental consciousness underlying the island's development.

Our first meeting was held on June 27, 2012, with eight members brainstorming—who should participate

a Phi Beta Kappa, with a B.A. in history. He began his 40-year career in Supply Chain Management working for several companies in New York City and Long Island, living in Miller Place, Long Island. Lou's daughter still lives in Miller Place where his granddaughters attend the same schools that their mother did. His two sons live in the Atlanta area and the older son has four boys.

LIBRARIAN'S CORNER

New Acquisitions

The Library has recently been the fortunate recipient of several book donations which have added significant depth to our collection.

James McDonald, a member of the Savannah Area Genealogical Association, visited the Heritage Library with SAGA and decided that part of his Scottish book collection should find a permanent home with the Library. Among the titles are *Moidart among the Clanranalds* and *The Clan Ranald of Knoydart and Glengerry*.

The Sun City Hilton Head Genealogy Special Interest Group decided that they had books which would be used more frequently at the Heritage Library and gave us a number of volumes including a set of 18th century church records from Lancaster and Berks Counties, Pennsylvania.

A major donation came from the estate of Lisa Hamilton's parents. Lisa's mother, a serious genealogist and a resident of Sun City Hilton Head, had a collection of more than 200 genealogy books which her daughter generously contributed to the Heritage Library. The collection features a large number of books dealing with Maine, Pennsylvania, and Ohio, as well as books dealing with other states and general research topics. Of special note is the eight volume series of *Maine Families in 1790* and *Maine Wills 1640–1760*.

On September 26 at 7:00 p.m. at the Library, Dr. Taylor and several of his students will present their assessments and recommendations regarding the preservation of the Baynard Mausoleum, the oldest extant structure on the Island. Attendance will be by invitation.

History Department

Our Historic Sites lectures which are held every Tuesday at 10:30 AM at the Library, have continued to draw interest from Island visitors and from the community.

Possibly because of the high temperatures, we have seen a slowdown in attendance at our weekly Fort Mitchel tours which are done in conjunction with the Coastal Discovery Museum. Through the end of July, attendance for the Historic Sites lectures has been 136 at the Library and 167 offsite. The Fort Mitchel tours have attracted 53 attendees since they resumed on March 7. Bill Altstaetter also presented a lecture on the history of Spanish Wells Plantation to 42 members of the Spanish Wells Club.

The History Department has been working on several additional new presentations. Sondra Shaw Hardy has created a presentation on the Role of Women in the History and Development of Hilton Head Island. Dee Phillips will be presenting an abbreviated version at a Zonta Club meeting on September 5. Dee will also make a presentation on the history of Palmetto Hall Plantation to their members on September 23.

We have been invited to present the Historic Sites lecture to the Sunset Rotary Club in October. We are also scheduled to do a presentation on the Battle of Savannah at the Spanish Wells Club in November. Based on feedback we have received from Historic Sites attendees, we will be working on lectures about the history of Hilton Head Island from 1956 to the present and on the history of Mitchelville.

Our efforts have also been directed towards the 350/30 Celebration and The People of Mitchelville Initiative . In preparation for the 350/30 celebration, we have written six articles for *Hilton Head Monthly* magazine on different historic sites on the island. We have also prepared ten 60-90-seconds-long radio spots on the historic sites which are being aired daily on the Adventure radio stations.

As always, we appreciate the assistance and continued support of all the officers and volunteers of the Heritage Library Foundation.

An Inspiring Volunteer

Lyman Wooster and his wife, Anne, moved to Hilton Head in 1988, and together they traveled throughout the Lowcountry taking photos of the churches and their associated cemeteries. When he had a large collection of photos and text to go with them, he and the Heritage Library found each

other. Beginning with the publication of that collection in a Library newsletter, a partnership began. Lyman became a volunteer at the Library and one of its principal researchers, helping preserve data and contributing articles on a variety of subjects. As physical limitations arose, Lyman cut his Library time but continued writing for its various newsletters, and providing valuable services as a knowledgeable copy editor.

Before coming to Hilton Head, Lyman had already lived a colorful life. Originally from Kansas, his career included stints as a political science teacher at the University of Pennsylvania, a civilian analyst of Soviet military and political affairs in Army Intelligence and Defense Department Intelligence, and later an analyst with the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency.

Some of the most colorful history of the Island is captured in his work. His articles have included Hilton Head's African-American cemeteries; Huguenot settlements at Purrysburg; the Stoneys, the Baynards, and their mansions; the aftermath of the Battle of Port Royal; the cycle of bloodshed during the American Revolution (was there really a "Bloody Legion"?); and the history of St. Luke's Parish. In his extensive study of General David Wooster (a collateral ancestor active in the Revolution) you can read about some of Benedict Arnold's activities before he defected.

Two more of Lyman's articles are in the pipeline for future issues of *Glimpses*, one on the Draytons and one on Squire Pope.

All of us can take inspiration from Lyman's remarkable record. Consider: In his upper eighties with a stellar career behind him, he began writing for the Library and was able to complete another substantial body of work.

May we all emulate him.

HISTORY DAY

Lawrence Rowland Tuesday October 1, 5:00 p.m. First Presbyterian Church

Presented by the Heritage Library and The Beaufort County Historical Society



History is essentially what we are celebrating in the island-wide 350/30 celebration and who better to celebrate it with than Lawrence Roland?

Rowland says "All American history begins with Beaufort County," but one could well say Beaufort County history begins with Lawrence Rowland.

Professor Emeritus of University of South Carolina Beaufort, Rowland is the acknowledged expert on Beaufort County and its place in the Low Country. His Volume I of *The History of Beaufort County*, which covers the period from 1514 to 1861, is one of the most-often consulted references at the Heritage Library. His recently-completed Volume II (with Stephen Wise) and Volume III are scheduled for release soon.

The First Presbyterian Church is located at 540 Wm. Hilton Parkway. The event is open to the public and admission is free. All are welcome



United States Colored Troops (USCT) in the Civil War

Soon after the Civil War began, the United State Government issued an order establishing the Bureau of Colored Troops. The purpose was to recruit colored soldiers to help the Union Army fight the Civil War. Regiments of colored troops were formed and made up what was known as the United States Colored Troops or USCT. At the

Heritage Library we are painstakingly researching the service and pension records of the USCT men who served here on Hilton Head Island during the Civil War.

Of the colored troops who joined the Union Army, more than 5,000 were recruited from the state of South Carolina, comprising six infantry regiments – the 21st, 33rd, 34th, 103rd, 104th and 128th and one artillery battery – Battery G, 2nd Light Artillery Regiment. A majority of the troops were former slaves on plantations who "joined up" once the war began thus obtaining their freedom. Recruiting stations were established throughout the Low Country and the ones mentioned most in the USCT records which the Library obtained from the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) were based in Charleston and on Hilton Head Island. The genealogical and historical information gleaned from these records is being transcribed into Excel. This information will eventually be placed on the Library's website.

Many local families surnames are found in the USCT files as well as references to nearby plantations and their owners. An interesting fact found in the records is that the slaves had their owners' surnames when joining the Army but after they were mustered out, they often took different surnames as a way of establishing their independence and distancing themselves from their former slave owners.

Library Volunteers Visit the Family History Library

The dream of every genealogist is a trip to the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, the world's largest repository of genea-

logical resources. Last fall, five volunteers from the Heritage Library—Nancy Burke, Diana Luellen, Ken and Jane Michel, and Sunni Winkler—made that dream a reality with a week-long trip to research their family histories.

The trip was organized by Sunni Winkler who had made three earlier visits. She thoroughly instructed the group on the layout of the Library and gave suggestions on how best to organize research there. The Family History Library spreads out over five floors and has a collection which includes 356,000 books, over 2.4 million rolls of microfilmed genealogical records, and 3,725 electronic databases. Advance preparation is essential to make the most of time spent there. However, there are on-site volunteers to give additional assistance.

All the participants made some new discoveries and some were also finally able to confirm that some "brick walls" will be nearly impossible to penetrate. As Diana noted: "I came away knowing that my 'brick wall' was still standing and not likely to be breeched." Sunni's investigations included research for some of the patrons of the Library and for prospective DAR members. Her results were also mixed, with the discovery of a vital link in one DAR application and the sad news that another prospective member did not have the Patriot ancestor she had hoped to claim. Every one, however, came away with positive results and a greater understanding of the range of genealogical materials available.

We found Salt Lake City to be an interesting town to explore, from the Church monuments on Temple Square to the dry mountains surrounding the valley in which the city is located. Rehearsals of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir are open to the public, as are daily organ recitals. The more adventurous can venture to the Great Salt Lake or Park City, a historic mining town as well as a ski resort.
