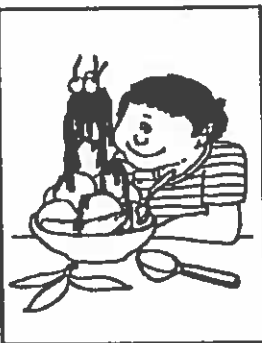

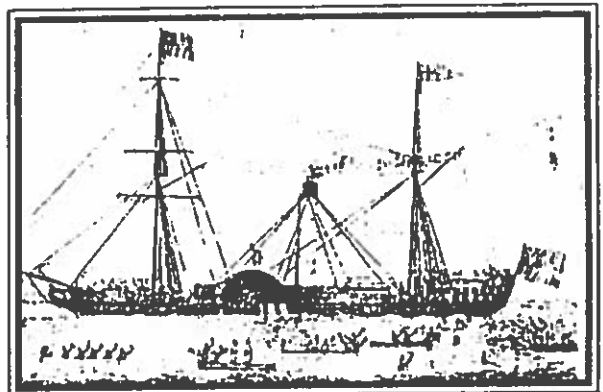

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## HOW COME MY STORY WASN'T PRINTED?

Most of you would be amazed at the amount of mail we get. The Peeples are doing a great job of keeping us informed, in fact, sometimes too good. Don't get us wrong, we need the help. (Don't say it!!) It's the cards, letters, pictures, stories and whatnot, that will make this newsletter outstanding. Unfortunately, with all this mail, we also get a lot of potentially great stuff that we can't use. Why, you ask? Because:

1 - It is handwritten and since we can't decipher our own handwriting all the time, we don't always dare attempt to with yours (who knows what might come out in print!).

2 - When the item was copied, the edges were cut off and we can't make out the entire story. (This is so frustrating.)

3 - Even when we get great material, unless it is directly or indirectly about the Peeples we can't use it.

We decided to print some guidelines:

- **Pictures (we don't get enough)**, e.g. cutest baby, oldest person or whatever. Black and white photos give the best results. Pictures with a dark background tend to blend the background into the subject for both black and colored photos. Color pictures are OK, if they are light enough. (Try to imagine what it would look like if changed to black and white, would it be too dark? Not dark enough? etc...) Please don't forget to include names, dates, places, and any additional information.

- **Biographies** - Oldest person, most interesting person, etc. We know some of these folks have led rich full lives, tell us about them or yourselves. Often times we receive just a name and birthdate, interesting but not very newsy.

Cutest baby - this is difficult, since most kids aren't really old enough to have accomplished much in their short life. (Except for the occasional overachiever). If your child is too young to have a history, or much of one, tell us about the proud parents or an interesting relation or genealogical history.

- **Stories about family history** - Almost anything goes here, but what works best are stories taken from family history books or family bibles. Old newspaper clippings about family members are great too. These can be taken from family scrapbooks and copied, you don't have to send us the original. Please include the name of the newspaper, city, state and date printed.

- **Photostatic copies** - when making copies, make sure you get the whole story copied. Otherwise, we just can't make sense out of them.

Also, we like to credit the material you send us, normally we include only your name, your city and state. Inquiries include the entire address so that you can be contacted directly. (Don't forget to let us know if these inquiries are answered.)

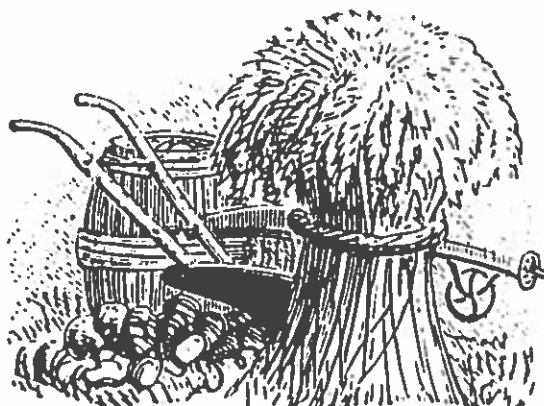
Thanks for all the stories, pictures and whatnot you send. We hope this will answer some of the questions you have. O.K. Now go out there, make history and tell us all about it.

## Peeples History - from page 1

We do know that Cristoforo Colombo showed up in 1492 (he didn't stay either). Cris was Italian but sailed under the Spanish flag for Queen Isabella. (Who had the bucks to finance such a crazy trip). He discovered (depending who you wish to believe) either the Bahamas, the Island of Guadeloupe in the West Indies, or America.



John Cabot was the first to lay English claims to the Americas. (Newfoundland - 1497). But it wasn't until 1588, when the English "did in" the Spanish Armada and effectively took control of the high seas, that England looked toward colonizing America. When Queen Elizabeth told Sir Walter Raleigh to "go for it" in Virginia, the transatlantic emigration rush hour was on. The first serious settlement was at Jamestown VA in 1607. Then in 1620 the Pilgrims (no Peeples family members on board) arrived on the Mayflower with their funny hats.



If you are a Peeples of Scotch persuasion (which seems to be the trend), your ancestors probably emigrated out of ports like Glasgow and Aberdeen - most likely during the 18th century. Their port of entrance was likely to be New York with Philadelphia and Boston a close second. They probably initially settled down in The mid-Atlantic and southeastern states

The major factor that seems to have motivated our Peeples ancestors to relocate to America was political oppression, with famine a close second. It might also be noted that a large number of emigrants out of Scotland and Northern Europe were considered criminals at the time. They left their homelands penniless and no doubt in debt (a crime at the time), to find the good life in America. How many illustrious Peeples immigrants were of this flavor is something we'll probably never know.

Melvina LaVesta(Vastita) d. 5 May 1890, buried at Old Sarepta Cemetery in Webster County, Miss.

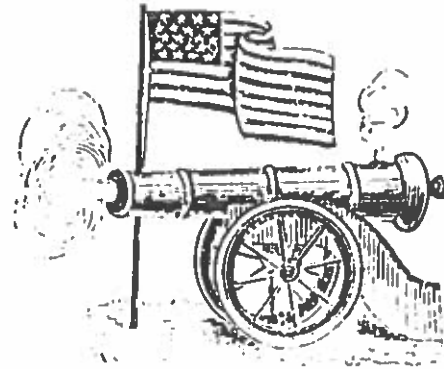

Exceptions ? You bet ! There are Peeples that didn't come from Scotland and didn't arrive here in the 18th century. Keep in mind that Peeples immigrants to the U.S. weren't all on the same boat. They arrived in a number of separate groups over a period of time. When chasing down those missing links keep in mind that folks have been coming from over there to over here for over 300 years.

**Our European cousins took the Revolutionary War badly.** Emigration slowed to a snails pace from 1776 till things settled down after the War of 1812.

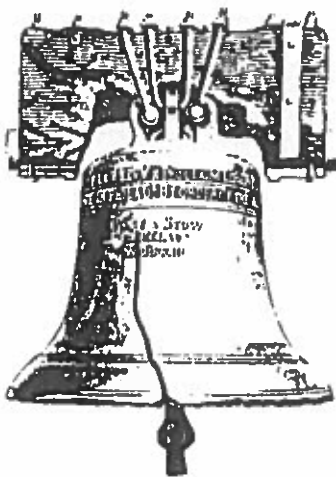
But then the potato (which had been introduced in Ireland, by Sir Walter Raleigh who got it from the Indians in Virginia) famines of 1847 inspired about millions to come over (between 1820-1920).



Early Peeples emigrants came over by sail, a grueling experience of six weeks duration (see accompanying article). The ships they came in were cargo ships slightly refitted for passengers. Most rode in "steerage" which was merely the cargo hold of the ship. It wasn't pleasant.

Later immigrants got a break. By the time their major emigrations were happening, the invention of steam power in the 19th century had cut the Atlantic crossing time from 6 sickening weeks to ten days.

Today, emigration has slowed to a trickle. I guess we're all here.



Die hard Peeples genealogists interested in early arrivals should check passenger manifests for ships leaving Glasgow and Aberdeen. (this kind of stuff is available through the L.D.S. (Mormon) branch library genealogy system). For later arrivals (post 1890) try the Ellis Island records (New York).

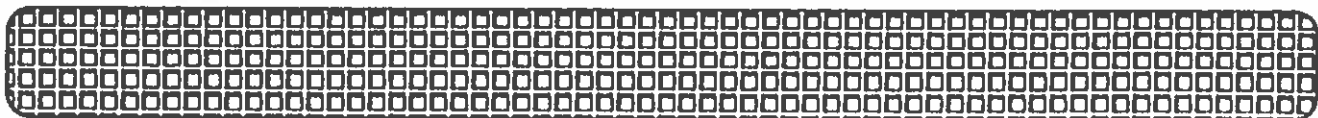

# Are You a Luke Warm Peeples Genealogist?

(The Family News Network) There is no such thing as a lukewarm genealogist. It's true that a run-of-the-mill family tree tracer methodically jots down what someone gives or sends to him, doesn't get very excited about the mail and can put genealogy aside in favor of going to lunch with a friend.

Think again. A true family tree nut will hide the telephone bill from his spouse, buy stamps by the sheet, not operate well until mail time, and then hate the mail man if nothing genealogical is delivered. He beats the typewriter until 2 a.m. and gets up the next day ready for more.

A real genealogist will plod through cemeteries looking for tombstones in pouring rain and winter's winds with fingers and toes numbing, flout poison ivy, and after finding that the film was not winding through the camera, as happened to me, travel many miles to the same cemetery under the same conditions in a second attempt to capture the same photos.

A genealogy bug collects papers full of possible information until the end of the house where they are stored, sags and then hesitantly suggests a room be added. All the while he is the steadiest customer of the public library, where he is recognized as the one who resembles a pack horse. A genealogist dislikes others who want to drone on about their family tree and findings. He loves anyone who is researching one of his names, even if it is Smith or Jones. He is always going to get things filed tomorrow but never does and thinks his knee-high piling system (as opposed to filing system) is justified no matter who has to wade through or fall over it. He likes to drone on and on about his family tree and findings, and can't bear to part with even the tiniest scrap of paper. After all, it might contain the missing link.

A genealogist can best be described as a loner, a mediator, a lover of clutter, a collector of dimes for copy machines and a constant student of history - especially migration routes of his forbearers. He tolerates non-genealogists and the people who refer to genealogy as a "hobby" - after all, he is discovering his personal history and is recording it all in one spot. If certain diseases follow him from one generation to the next, he can possibly assist a doctor with a diagnosis. He abhors those who say they started but found a skeleton in the closet - granted, there may be skeletons, but we can't be responsible for them. He knows too, that the very person who thinks genealogy is silly will some day eat humble pie and ask, knowing that the answer will be there.

A genealogist thinks exercise is nutty and time-consuming. He believes there is enough exercise in stooping, bending over file drawers and lifting boxes to the table.

A genuine genealogist spends money for gas instead of clothes. He buys expensive books, paper by the ream, envelopes by the hundreds, loose-leaf notebooks, subscriptions to county publications, and some even buy home copy machines and microfilm readers. Typically, a reasonable man may be found in the midst of this craze and if he feels he is spending too much, he cuts corners until he clears his conscience.

Most genealogists are amiable. After all, who can argue with a forbearer? We put faces on people of long ago, imagine ourselves in their shoes and try to reason why they moved again - at the same time we know that most married a neighbor because there was no one else to meet.

Much can be learned from "digging" into one's past: perseverance, patience, logic and respect for those who were here before. We feel we will have to live to be a hundred to accomplish all that is necessary.

Counting yourself as number 1 in 10 generations, you will find 1,023 direct ancestors. This is part of the fascination of genealogy - it is never finished.





## Voyage of the Bachelor from page 1

Many ships never made it, sending their passengers straight to Davy Jones' locker. (We hope to list Peeples family members who were lost at sea in the upcoming "Who's Who In the Peeples Family")

The general plight of trans-Atlantic emigrants is well exemplified in the trials and tribulations of the Hogg party of 1773-1774 as described in "Voyages to the West" by Bernard Bailyn (Alfred Knopf, Inc.)

James Hogg was a beaten Scottish Lowlander in the early 1770's. Lawlessness and bad crops had conspired to rob this 30 year old farmer/family man of his just due.

When his brother (who had emigrated to America a decade earlier) returned for a visit with tales of wonder, James decided to relocate his family across the sea.

With the financial aid of his American brother, James booked the *Bachelor*, a 260 ton vessel out of Edinburgh. The Hogg party had grown to 51 members - they got the "good seats" - cabins of sorts. The bulk of the remaining passengers (about 213 of them) had coughed up four pounds apiece for the luxury of riding in "steerage" or "the hold".

Most were farmers 1/"free of foul and infectuous diseases", 2/"of proven good character", and 3/ "able to pay". All had had to sell their entire household and livestock to come up with the fare. All except four were members of one of the 46 families represented on the *Bachelor*.

The plan was to sail out of Thurso (northern Scotland) during mid-summer 1773 and to arrive in North Carolina in early fall. The American brother owned 12,000 acres in the Carolinas. It was to be developed with the aid of everyone on the *Bachelor*.

Well the *Bachelor* didn't sail until September 14th due to various delays. It was immediately set upon by a vicious storm. For five days it bobbed about being blown backwards and to the north. It put into the Orkneys for six days of fixing leaks.

The second try resulted in 90 miles headway to the west before running into an even worse storm. Then they were blown back even further - all the way to the Shetlands (see map).

What else can go wrong? SMALL POX !!!!. A number of the kids came down with it and the dreaded disease spread quickly. ANOTHER STORM !!! Ripped the *Bachelor* from its anchorage in the Shetlands, smashed it against the rocks causing near terminal damage.

Winter set in heavily in the Shetlands. The ship's passengers were at the mercy of the philanthropy of the Shetland Islanders. (which was considerable considering they had been putting up with these backward sailing mishaps for years).

Well, to make a long story short, the *Bachelor* limped into Leith Scotland the following spring. The steerage passengers were basically "dumped". The Hogg party was able to secure separate passage that summer and arrived safely.

The moral of the story I guess is never to ride steerage. An interesting afterthought of this entire adventure is that James Hogg, poor farmer from Scotland, two years later was negotiating with the likes of John Adams and Thomas Jefferson at the Continental Congress meeting. He was also there on July 4, 1776.

Such was the fertile American environment in the 1770s.

Dear Editors,

The first news letter I received from you as well as the one I received yesterday contained an error that I am sure you do not want to perpetuate. This error is serious and will be resented by most Scots. You referred to Scots people as "Scotch people." There is no such thing! Scotch is whiskey.

In your business I am sure you do not wish to offend any of your customers. I don't care but I do think it indicates ignorance and lack of research.

In the Summer 1990 issue you published a letter that Peeples was derived from Peebles. I researched this matter twice in Scotland and was unable to guesstimate when the separation took place. Both names seem (no proof) to have been something like Pyls with no indication of meaning or derivation. Like Pogo said, "It happened a hell of a long time ago."

There is also the "Peoples". I suppose that there is some basis for assuming that this name came from the same root as Peeples or Peebles but it seems to have come from a region in Normandy in France and to have an altogether different derivation and language.

Before the Scots and Irish these people (and a lot of others) were Celts. (Before you make a mistake with "Celts" it is pronounced "Kelts"). The Celts were once all over Europe. They defeated the Romans along with a lot of others. They depended on their priests for record keeping and there was no written language in general use.



The Celts were barbarians and they didn't go for much control or "government"!

John W. Campbell, Jr. said that there are only three kinds of people: 1. Citizens, 2. Tribesmen, and 3. Barbarians. Citizens owe allegiance to governments. Tribesmen to a Chief and Barbarians (with reluctance) to a family group or Clan.



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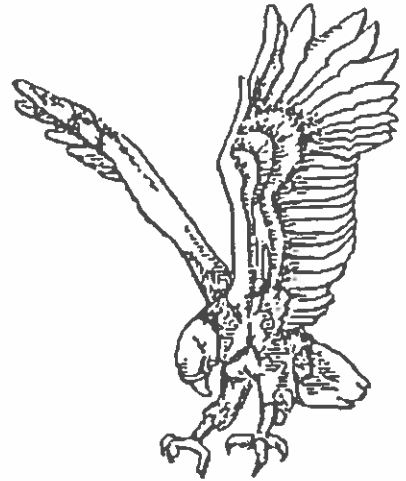
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
