The English, I understand, the name was Elizabeth, Kingdon's Hardy, is not a family name - till began with William Kingdon, who was a Barber - His Russell of course is supposed to have come through Lord John Russell, but my father was named after his Mother's stepfather, Benjamin Russell of Charleston. His niece of my Grandfather, Emily, and Sarah Catherine were co-sponsors of Matthew Bythewood who married a Miss Russell (Eng.). My grandmother Rebecca Howard was born in Bechtel's Prison in 1732. The Bechtel's Colony sent one out to S.C. and settled the one half of the same name. Andrew Verdier (Huguenot) was the school master of this new Colony and he educated, and afterwards married the young girl Rebecca. He died, and she married John Johnson, 1766. (See P. 2.) - Their old home in Beaufort is still standing and bears on one of its timbers the scar made by a British cannon ball received during the war of the Revolution. Carefully preserved. -

The Ficklings were English, but came to America from the Bermudas. There were three brothers, and one named George, came to South Carolina. In Ralph's History, I am pleased to find a contribution in pounds s. to the building fund of the first Church on the Island, from one of my ancestors; Mr. Grandfather's sister "Charlotte" resided the first two months in what we call the "Red Brick House" there. My Grandfather, "William Fickling" and his Brother "James & George" settled in Beaufort Co. S.C. Grandfather died in Beaufort Jan 17, 1807, of a broken heart, grieving for his youngest son, "Landon" - One Sarah, another was born in Ark, and died 1851 - My Mother, Sarah Johnson Fickling Nov 3, 1873. -
