

EVEREARD Purcell de Bourdeau and his wife Catherine
 FRESNÉ fled to England from Grenoble, France after the
 Revocation of the Edict of Nantes in 1685. Their son,
 Jacques de Bourdeau, born ~~1670~~^{1630/40} in Grenoble, married
 c. 1670 Madelaine ^(or Goullion) Gaillond and resided in Grenoble until
 1686 when they emigrated to South Carolina with their three
 daughters; Marguerite, born c. 1675 who married Anthony Poitevin,
 Madeline and Judith, born in Grenoble c. 1678 and 1680.
 Their three sons: Antoine, Jacques and Israel ^{and a daughter Margaret} were born in
 Carolina. On 26 July 1697 Jacques had a grant of 400 acres between
 French Quarter Creek & Cooper River. He made his will 19 September
 1699 leaving a town lot in Charles Town to each ^{of his three} daughters and his only
 surviving son, Anthony de Bourdeau. He died in Dec. 1699 and his
 wife shortly thereafter. Their home was on the northwest corner of Broad
 & King Streets and is still standing, much altered, the oldest house in
 Charleston.

On 24 Feb. 1709 Madelaine de Bourdeau Brabant & her husband, Dr.
 Daniel Brabant, executed an Indenture, buying the shares of Marguerite,
 Judith & Anthony in their father's 400-acre plantation, known still as
 Brabant Plantation. Their daughter, Madelaine Brabant (died 1761) married
 at Purrysburg in May 1735 Henri de Saussure (18 July 1709 - 1761).
 (1680- Judith de Bourdeau married in 1709 as his second wife, Pierre
 Robert, Jr. (1675 - Mar. 1731) and their first child, Jacques de Bourdeau
 Robert was born 3 April 1711 at Jamestown, French Santee, S.C.
