## **AMELIA JENKINS TWITCHELL**

Amelia was born September 2, 1842 in Bethel, Oxford County, Maine – the twin sister of another Freedmen teacher, Adeltha Twitchell.<sup>1</sup> Amelia was appointed by the American Missionary Association in November 1864 and was assigned upon arrival to Mitchellville.<sup>2</sup> She transferred in December 1865 to Seabrook Plantation after her sister's early departure from Mitchellville to marry.<sup>3</sup>

She wrote a letter to her future husband John Mead Gould on November 26, 1865 that "it was a greater trial than I had anticipated to go back alone" when she faced returning to South Carolina or the new school year without her sister. Amelia finally transferred again in June 1867 to Augusta, Georgia. She continued teaching freedmen

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and their children in the South for 9 years. Amelia died October 5, 1926.<sup>6</sup> She was buried with her husband, John Mead Gould and daughter Annie (who was a missionary murdered in the 1900 Boxer Rebellion in China) in the Riverside Cemetery in Bethel, Maine.<sup>7</sup>
